Jack McGinnis Is Conservation Farmer of Year for District



Jack McGinnis of the Riverside community has been named as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer of 1967 by the board of supervisors of the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District. This award is presented each year to the individual whom the board of supervisors feel has done the most outstanding job of conserving his soil, water and plant resources.

Mr. McGinnis was presented a plaque by the Crowell Lions Club at their meeting February 13. The presentation was made by J. A. Marr, member of the board of supervisors.

McGinnis farms approximately 460 acres of land southwest of Crowell, and about 242 acres east of Margaret. He has been a cooperarator with the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District since 1948. He lacks only one project of having completed the outline of work called for in a Great Plains Conservation Program contract which he signed in 1965.

He has used seventeen different practices in his effort to do the total conservation job on these two farms.

"We should all be proud of a man like Jack McGinnis, who is dedicated to conserving his soil and water," said John McAlister of the Crowell SCS office. McAlister further stated that "we need more men who are interested in conserving our soil and water resources for future generations. The future of our nation depends upon each of us and how concerned we are with taking care of the land God has given us. After all, we are only stewards of the soil. Soil conservation should be of great concern to each and every American whether he lives in the city or on the farm."

He will be working with the youth each evening for an hour of music and fellowship beginning at 6.

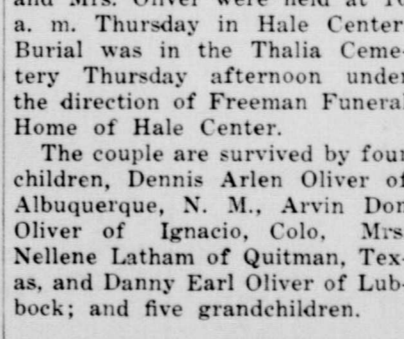

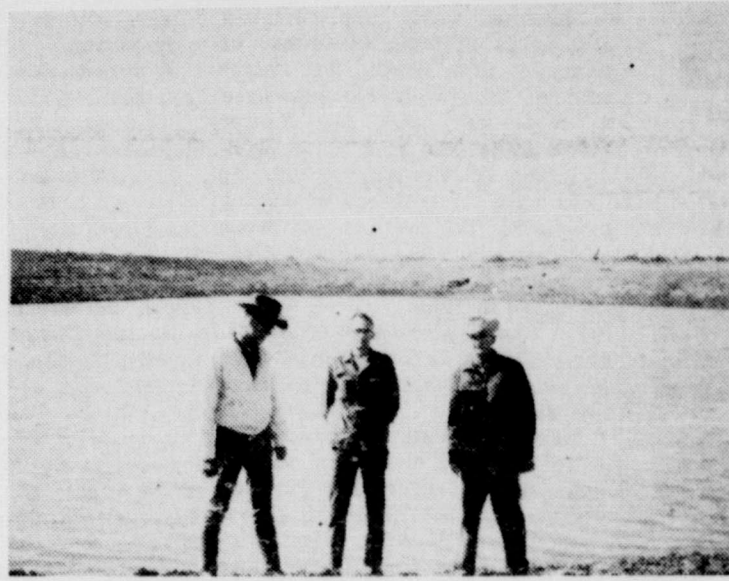
Farmer of the Year

Jack McGinnis of Crowell has been selected for the Outstanding Conservation Farmer Award for 1967 by the Board of Supervisors of the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District. This award is presented each year to the individual who has done the most outstanding job of conserving his soil, water and plant resources. On February 13, 1968, Mr. McGinnis was presented a plaque by the Crowell Lions Club in recognition of his conservation work.

Jack farms approximately 460 acres of land southwest of Crowell and about 242 acres northeast of Crowell. He has been a cooperor with the Lower Pease River Soil and Water Conservation District since 1948. In 1965, Jack entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract on each farm. A system of parallel terraces on the farm northeast of Crowell is all that Mr. McGinnis lacks having complete conservation plans carried out on both farms. Jack has used seventeen different practices in his effort to do the total conservation job on these two farms. He gives the Soil Conservation Service credit for providing valuable technical help to him in his efforts to take care of his land.

Listed below are Mr. McGinnis' accomplishments in carrying out a sound soil and water conservation plan:

- 38,544 feet of parallel terraces.
- 727 feet of standard terraces.
- 2,993 feet of diversion terraces.
- 12.1 acres of grassed waterways.
- 105 acres of brush control (tree dozing.)
- 105 acres of range seeding.
- 1 farm pond.
- 1 fish pond stocking.
- 160 acres proper grazing use of rangeland.
- 160 acres range deferred grazing.
- 511 acres conservation cropping system.
- 511 acres stubble mulching.
- 353 acres contour farming.
- 17 acres pasture planting.
- 17 acres pasture management.
- 1 sprinkler irrigation system.
- 17 acres of irrigation water management.

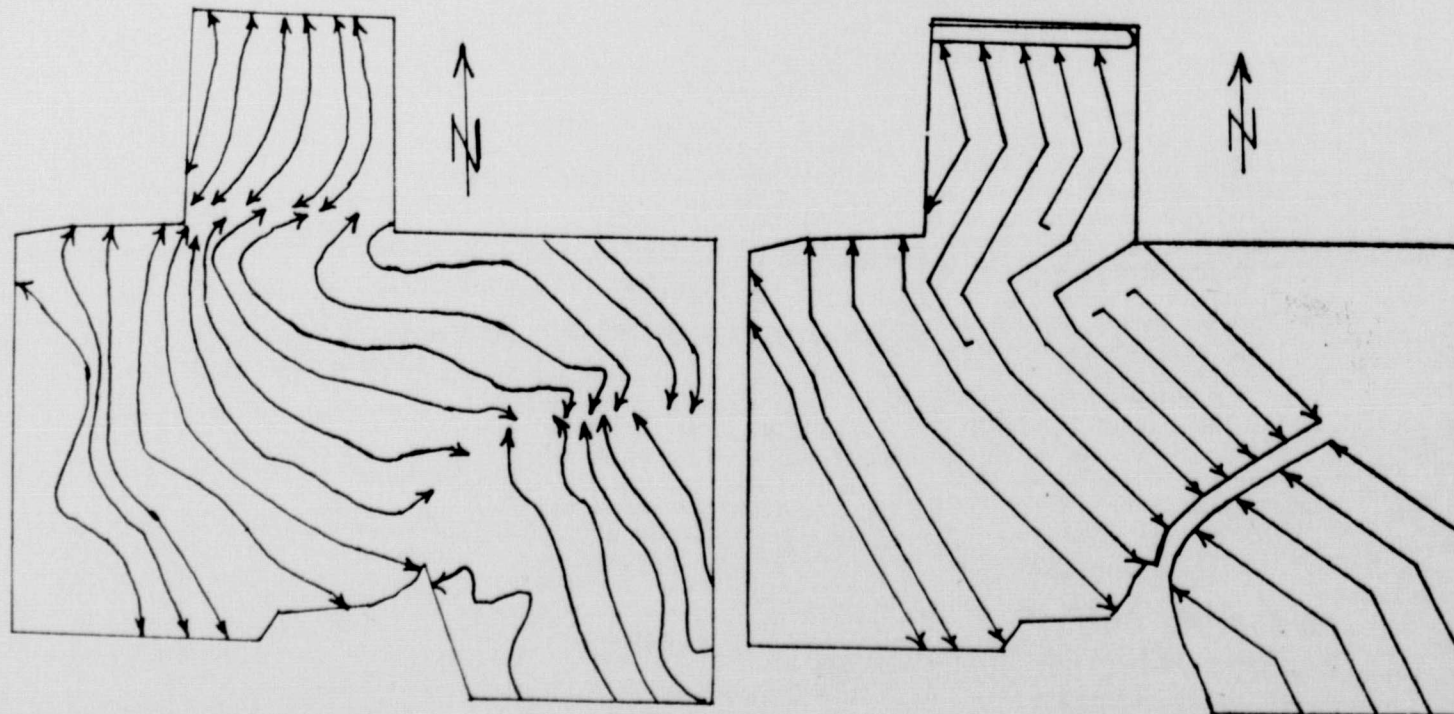

1968 Easter Seal Campaign to Begin March 1

Last year, 17,622 handicapped persons received help from the Texas Easter Seal Society, Mr. Kincaid explained. But the needs of the handicapped and cost of providing expert professional care are rising and more money than ever before will be needed to serve the handicapped during 1968.

The Easter Seal Appeal mail will be delivered in Foard County about March 1, Mr. Kincaid stated.

Funds raised in the Easter Seal Appeal help support 21 Easter Seal centers in Texas where crippled children and adults are provided services regardless of ability to pay.

"The people of Texas have always responded to our needs, and I feel certain that they will make it possible to increase the Easter Seal services to the crippled during the coming year," said Mr. Kincaid. The Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults is an affiliate of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults which last year provided services for almost a quarter of a million handicapped persons.

Two Minutes With the Bible

When the Lord Asked Why
 There are two occasions when the Lord asked "Why?" which stand out from all the rest.

Once it was to God He cried and once to Saul of Tarsus. Once to the Holy One and once to the chief of sinners. Once He cried it from the shameful cross and once from His glory in heaven. In each case the name was repeated.

In Matt. 27:46 we find the first anguished "Why?" as He cried: "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" The other is found in Acts 9:4, where He calls from His exile in heaven: "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?"

These two questions represent the greatest riddles of history and yet strangely, one of them is the simple solution to the other! Why did God forsake His Son? You will find the answer when you ask why mankind, represented by Saul, forsook and even persecuted God's Son. God's action, in giving Christ up to die, was the antidote to man's sin. Christ's death was the remedy for man's sin. It was because of the utter unreasonableness of man's sin that God, to save him, had to be more than reasonable.

Saul had led his nation and the world in rebellion against Christ, but this is just why, in infinite love God chose him to become the great apostle of grace, telling the world that "Christ died for our sins."

Hear him tell how he had been "a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious" but how "the grace of our Lord was exceeding abundant" (I Tim. 1:13,14). Hear him say:

"Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. Howbeit for this cause I obtained mercy, that in me first Jesus Christ might show forth all longsuffering, for a pattern to them which should hereafter believe on Him to life everlasting" (vers. 15,16).

Since the "chief of sinners" is now in heaven, there is hope for us all if we but trust in the Christ who died for us.

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Uncle Sam's Selective Service

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 702 Colorado Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—I finished high school in January and entered college a week later. What must I do to get a II-S student deferment?

A—You must request it from your board in writing. After you're in college, you should have the school send a student certificate to your board providing evidence you are satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction.

Q—Will you tell me about how a draft appeal board is set up?

A—One appeal board is established in each federal judicial district. These boards normally have five members, appointed by the President upon recommendation of the governor. Members must be U. S. citizens who are not members of the armed forces or their reserves, must be residents of the district, and at least 30 years old. The appeal board should include a physician, a lawyer, representatives from labor and industry, and if applicable, from agriculture.

Q—I'm over age 26. Recently,

I was declared a delinquent and ordered to report for induction. If the induction ages are 18½ through 25, how can I be inducted?

A—Men deferred on or after June 19, 1951, are liable for training and service until age 35. Additionally, any person who has failed or refused to report for induction remains liable for induction, and, when available, can be inducted immediately, regardless of age. A man who has received a delinquency notice has the same rights of personal appearance and appeal as any other man.

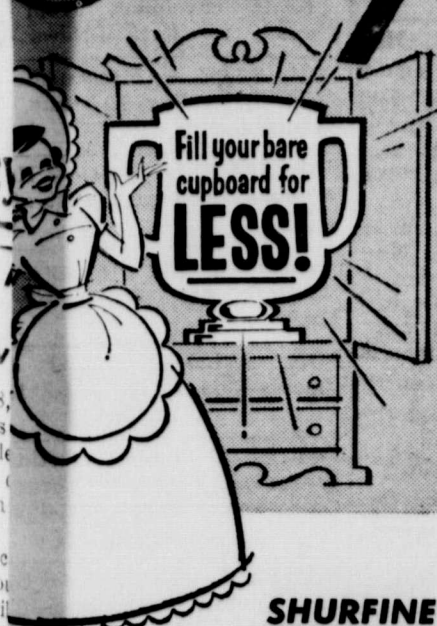

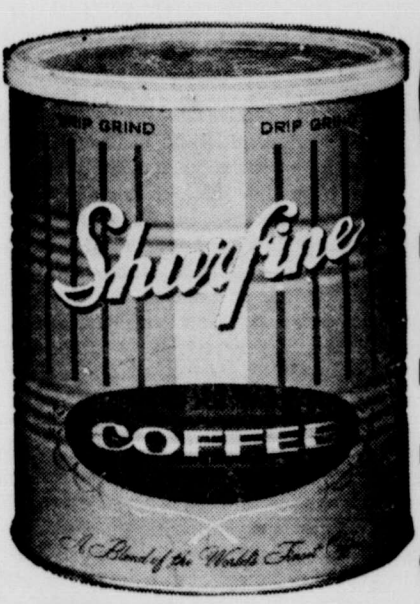

Grant Received to Train Teachers for Mentally Retarded

Region IX Education Service Center in Wichita Falls has secured a \$24,650 federal grant to establish a program to train teachers for educable mentally retarded children residing in the region's 12-county North Texas area. Dr. James C. McBride, director, announced this week.

Foard County is a part of the 12-county region.

Dr. McBride, who has just returned from a meeting of the Texas Elementary and Secondary School Planning Council in Austin, said the training of as many as 50 teachers for the 47 school districts in the region would start this summer.

The initial appropriation, allocated by the Texas Education Agency under Title VI, Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), would finance the program from June 1 through August 31 and supply teachers to the districts at the start of the 1968 school term. Additional funds to continue inservice training during the year are anticipated by mid-summer, Dr. McBride said.

The Center, Dr. McBride disclosed, would contract with Midwestern University to conduct three weeks of intensive training for the selected teachers in collaboration with the Center.

Dr. McBride said the need for special education teachers was deemed critical in the North Texas region. Three per cent of the population in the U. S. can be classified as mentally retarded, according to statistical definition, and this percentage is generally applicable to subpopulations such as Region IX. Applied to the 42,000 scholastics in the region, this ratio would involve 1,260 children of school age in Region IX.

"Districts in the region always have had the problem of educating these children but have had no facilities to train teachers," Dr. McBride pointed out. Some districts, he said, have gone so far as to set up special education units, and then could not staff them, since "special education people are in critically short supply."

The city of San Antonio built a \$10.5 million three-building civic center complex on the site of HemisFair '68, including a 3,000 seat banquet hall and 2,800 seat theater.

The sergeant reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law there will be additional inspection this year including: steering, wheels and rims, and front seat belts where the anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period may find that they will need to install seat belts. With the last minute rush, there may not be enough seat belts kits to take care of the demand.

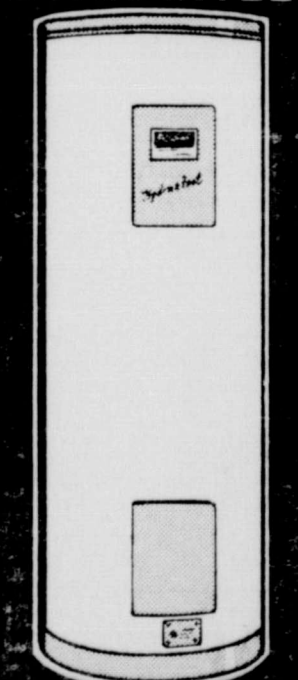
