County to Observe 77th Birthday on Saturday, April 27

Saturday, April 28, marks the seventy-seventh birthday of Foard County.

It was on April 4, 1891, a committee composed of J. H. Self, J. A. Wright and J. C. Sanders met at Margaret and laid out boundary lines for four commissioners' precincts, selected voting places and named presiding officers for an election to be held on April 27 to determine the place of the county seat and to elect county officers. Crowell and Foard City were vying for the county seat. Crowell won in the election on April 27 and the contract for the first court house was let in 1892 at a cost of \$4,250.

Anniversary of Tornado
Sunday, April 28, also marks another, less pleasant, anniversary for Foard County. It was 26 years ago next Sunday that a tornado struck Crowell, killing eleven people, injuring more than one hundred, and leaving 1500 homeless.

Mrs. T. B. Klepper, 81, longtime associate editor and partner in The Foard County News, died in the Foard County Hospital Friday, April 19, following an illness of three years.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock conducted by the pastor, Rev. Ernest McGaughey. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home directing.

Serving as pall bearers were J. T. Hughton, Goodloe Meason, Dan Callaway, Newell Hofmann, Pat McDaniel and A. A. Manning. The former Miss Virginia Newton was born in Cooke County, on June 29, 1886, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Newton. She received her education in the Gainesville Public Schools and C. I. A. in Denton. A school teacher for many years before her marriage, she served as principal of the old North School in Gainesville for a number of years. She was married to T. B. Klepper in Gainesville on June 24, 1922, and moved to Crowell where she had made her home since. She was active for many years in the Methodist Church here, serving as Sunday school teacher and superintendent of the Children's Sunday School Department for a number of years. She was a member of the Eastern Star Chapter in Crowell.

For many years, she was active on the staff of the local newspaper. Mrs. Klepper was preceded in death by her husband on Nov. 3, 1966. She is survived by one son, Bill; and two grandsons, John William and Dan Allen, all of Crowell.

Over 100 Here for Wheat Growers Meeting Thursday

Over one hundred members of the Rolling Plains Wheat Growers Association gathered in Crowell last Thursday night for the organization's annual spring meeting.

John Cogdell of Crowell is the newly-elected president of the Association and he stressed that the wheat growers association is not an organization to help grow better wheat, but that it is only interested in the price. Mr. Cogdell explained that the Rolling Plains Wheat Growers Association is a member of the Texas W. G. A. and also works closely with the national association.

Another local speaker, Monroe B. Karcher, a member of the National Wheat Growers Association board of directors, said that 60 per cent of the nation's wheat production—from a price standpoint—is in serious trouble. The Foard County producer said the national association was helpful in obtaining certificates for 40 per cent of the crop in past legislative battles and this amount will return 100 per cent of parity to the wheat farmer.

Mr. Karcher said the national association also was instrumental in getting Public Law 480 put on the books to allow overseas shipment of millions of bushels of wheat.

However, he said, on the other side, the association asked for an export certificate on the 60 per cent of wheat not used in domestic consumption, but failed to get this from Congress. He added that the association also had endorsed a grain reserve bill which failed to pass.

Dwight Hamilton of Olney, the immediate past president of the RPWGA, told of a recent trip to Washington representing Texas wheat growers. He explained that the 1965 wheat program will expire after the 1969 crop. Hamilton said the association went on record as endorsing an extension of the present wheat program, with a few modifications such as a 65 per cent export subsidy.

The Olney wheat official also explained how the grain reserves will work and how it would improve the wheat market if it were to be passed.

Evaluation Team Visits Remedial Reading Dept.

On Thursday, April 18, an evaluation team from the "Peso" Education Service Center, Region XVI, of West Texas State University, composed of Mrs. Wilsam Hill and Jack Shelton, visited the remedial reading department of the Crowell Public Schools.

They were accompanied by Jim Williamson of the Sound-Photo Co. of Amarillo, who brought his "Travel Tutor," a trailer with many modern visual aids on display. The grade school teachers, the principals and the superintendent were given demonstrations by Mr. Williamson on the use of the various aids.

An objective evaluation is made of the remedial reading department of the schools each year. A report of the in-visit will be completed and sent to the superintendent at a later date. Mrs. Marie Hofmann and Mrs. Faye Statter are the remedial reading teachers in the local school. Last year, an evaluation team from Midwestern University visited the school.

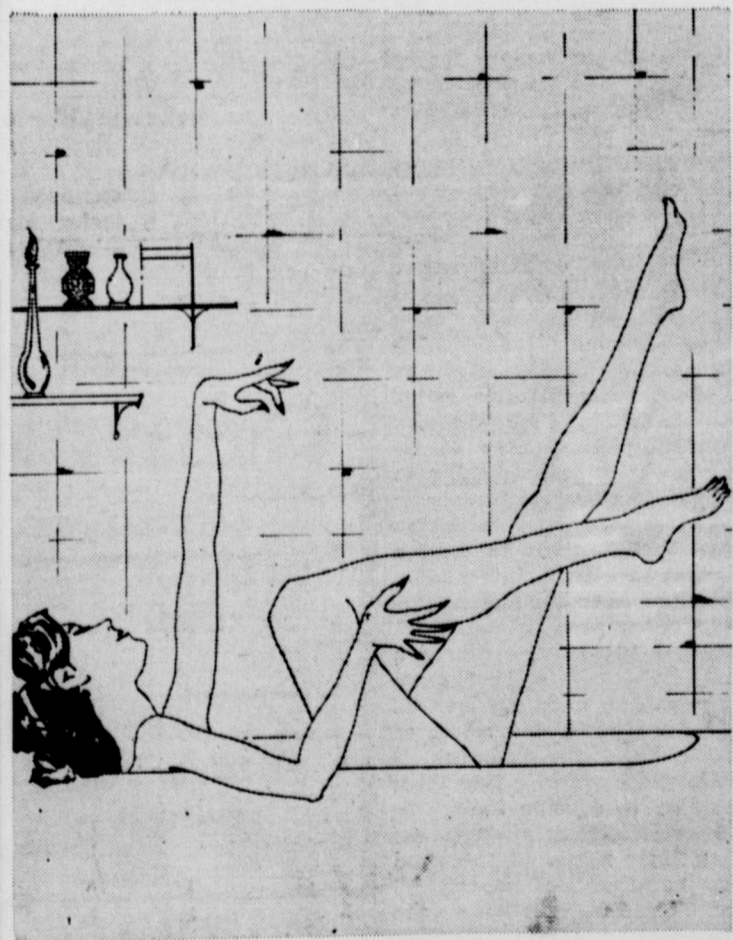

Grade School Boys Visit Local Library

"The library is sometimes called the memory of the human race," so spoke the Library chairman, Mrs. Fred Wehba, to an audience of grammar school's 7th and 8th grade boys last week. The group, brought by their teacher, Mrs. W. F. Stater, were on their first trip through the Foard County Library.

The world of books and reading was skillfully opened to their minds as Mrs. Wehba talked on the purpose of libraries, their place in the history of mankind, and the many services that they render to the public. Below are excerpts from her talk.

"The public library is one of the most important servants of its community. It provides knowledge and information on all subjects for everyone.

"When God made man, He created him with a mind—a mind that would be curious about the world about him and about his accomplishments. This uniqueness is what sets man apart from the animals. So, man set about seeking knowledge in the most primitive way—that is, retaining it in his mind and handing it down to his children by the oral telling. Soon, the ancient men were not satisfied with leaving no records of their accomplishments. They sought to preserve their memory. The first attempt made by man to record happenings in writing was made on clay tablets in the form of cut symbols called cuneiforms. That was the crude beginning of the first library in history. Libraries are called the memory of the human race because it is like a giant brain that remembers all that scientists, historians, poets, philosophers, and others have thought and learned. It is also a meeting place of the ideas and words of persons who have influenced the world. It is also a place where the experience of the past can meet the needs of the present. Somewhere in that misty early dawn of history, man discovered that knowledge is power. From this discovery emerged the need, desire and purpose of libraries.

"The first public lending library in America was established by Benjamin Franklin in Philadelphia in 1731. "Through the magic doors of your library, you can step into a world of adventure and learning. Today you may 'travel' in your mind to the court of King Arthur and his knights. Tomorrow, you may visit an American Indian family or go voyaging to the Antarctic with a scientific expedition, or read about your favorite sport. To those who fear that television and motion pictures may be replacing books, it is heartening to know that sometimes after seeing a motion picture or a television program, people want to read a book to gain more information about the topic of the film or program.

"Here in Crowell, we are in a small way trying to best serve the community and county. If more children avail themselves of the many books for their use, it can help and serve in giving them opportunity to develop their habits of good reading thereby expanding their minds to the good and positive things of the world."

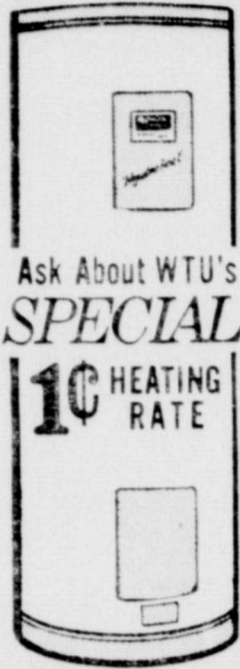

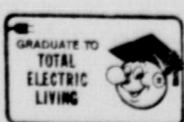

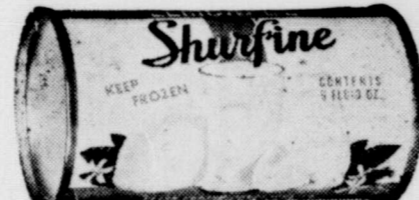
