The second proposition is "for" or "against" enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting horse racing with parimutuel wagering on a local option basis; creating a Texas Horse Racing Board with the power to reghorse races; granting two per cent of the total pari-mutuel pool each day to each county where there is a licensed race track; and apportioning among all other counties one-half of the total state net

A-No. The legal basis was es tablished by enactment of the Selective Service Act of 1948. The Military Selective Service Act of 1967 only amended certain portions of that basic law.





If a mailer does not strike a omplainant's name from this nailing list, and the patron reeives a second mailing 30 days fter the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a federal court order directing comoliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

Premium on Doctor **Bill Insurance Part of Medicare Goes Up**

The premium for the doctor oill insurance part of medicare increases from \$3 to \$4 in April, Edwin Draughon, social security nanager, this week reminded oldr people in the 5-county area serviced by the Vernon office. Persons 65 and over who are enrolled for the supplementary medical insurance and receiving monthly social security benefits will find the checks delivered to them April 3rd a dollar less than last month's payment, Mr. Draughon said. For an elderly couple receiving a combined benefit check, the reduction will be \$1 each, or a total of \$2.


