## 4-H CLUB RALLY DAY WILL BE HELD HERE THURSDAY, JUNE 27

The annual Foard County 4-H Club Rally Day will be held on Thursday, June 27, at the community center in Crowell, Foard County Extension Agents, Mrs. Virginia Iseng and Joe Burkett announced Monday.

Registration will be from 8:30 until 9 a. m. Each person attending will need to bring a sack lunch with his name on it. Cold drinks, potato chips and pickles will be furnished free of charge.

Activities for the day will consist of recreation events, educational demonstrations and swimming in the Crowell pool.

William A. McClung, Rural Civil Defense specialist from Texas A&M University, will be in charge of fire safety and recreational activities.

Swimming will be free choice and those who plan to swim are reminded by the agents to bring a towel, swimming suit, and money for swimming.

At 6 p. m. a barbecue supper will be served, and after a short resper the rally day will be concluded.

Cost of the rally day will be \$1.00 for each 4-H'er who attends which will be paid when registering. A ticket will be issued for the barbecue.

"Every 4-H boy and girl is eligible to attend and we hope all 4-H'ers will be present," the extension agents added.

### Public Hearing by Parks and Wildlife Department to Be Held Here Thursday

Foard County landowners and residents will be given an opportunity to express their wishes to the Parks and Wildlife Department about hunting seasons, bags and limits when the department holds a public hearing here this afternoon (Thursday) beginning at 2 p. m. The meeting will be held in the district court room in the Foard County court house.

As a result of information gathered and presented at this public hearing, hunting dates for 1968, and bag limits will be recommended for approval by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

This county had been under the general state hunting laws until last year when it was placed in the Panhandle Regulatory Authority, which means that the seasons, bag limits, etc., are set by the Parks and Wildlife Department, rather than by the Texas Legislature, which sets the general hunting laws.

The first meeting held last year resulted in an 82-day quail season for the county.

All interested Foard County residents are urged to attend the meeting this afternoon and express their opinion as to proposed hunting regulations for the county.

### Savings Bonds Sales During April Total \$2,013,000

Sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares during the month of April amounted to \$2,013,000 in Foard County. Seven per cent of the county's 1968 goal of \$70,000 has been achieved with a total of \$5,057,000 sold to date during the year.

Total purchases of E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas during April were \$16,729,456 which is an increase of 21 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967. Year-to-date sales were \$62,708,055—11 per cent higher than a year ago.

### Intentional Burning of Stubble Brings Out Fire Department

In answer to the fire alarm which was sounded about the middle of the afternoon Tuesday, the Crowell Volunteer Fire Department made a run to the Loraine Carter farm just north of Crowell where wheat stubble was afire.

Only thing was, Mr. Carter set the fire intentionally to burn the stubble off, and the fire department was not needed.

Harvesting of Foard County's 1968 wheat crop, although slowed by wet and damp weather during the past week, had progressed to a point Tuesday where a total of 839,000 bushels of the new crop had been delivered to the county's elevators.

Barley receipts at the elevators are something over 26,000 bushels, and over 3,000 bushels of oats were reported as being received at the elevators.

Although yields generally were cut considerably by rust early in the season, and rain and hail damage about harvest time, they are reported to be above normal. The most disappointing aspect of the harvest has been the price of wheat. Wheat price at the beginning of harvest was \$1.34 and by Monday of this week, it had dropped to \$1.26 per bushel. Last year, the price reached a high of \$1.64.

A great deal of wheat yet remains to be cut, especially in the east part of the county where over an inch of rain was received last Friday night, and fields have been too wet for combines to operate.

This week, a large number of the combines in the area for the harvest have moved on to other wheat areas to the north and west and early this week some local farmers were having trouble locating combines to cut their wheat.

Late in the afternoon for the past several days, fairly long lines of trucks have formed at the elevators with about 30 trucks being the most waiting at any one time.

One elevator operator said Tuesday that most fields were cutting about 20 or 25 bushels per acre, with scattered fields yielding more and, of course, others yielding less.

Although a great deal of wheat yet remains to be cut, with favorable weather prevailing for the next few days, the harvest should wind up shortly.

### About 50 Per Cent of Wheat Is Cut in the Truscott and Gilliland Section

About 50 per cent of the wheat crop in the Truscott area had been harvested by Monday. No wheat was being cut Monday morning except on Antelope Flat, west of Truscott. That area did not receive the rains of last Thursday which ranged from .8 to 1.2 inches at Truscott to almost two inches near Gilliland. Jim Cash reported that while others were seeking shelter from the wind, hail and rain that afternoon, just across the fence he was combining wheat at his place near Gilliland.

The harvest is returning an average yield. Farmers say it would have been a bumper crop except for the heavy wind storm Friday night, May 31, and the cloudy damp weather since. Wheat stalks, weakened from rust damage, blew down and the wind damage was estimated as high as one-third in some fields. The wheat is ripe and ready now, but high humidity and muddy fields have slowed combining. Very little plowing has been done in harvested fields due to moisture conditions.

One former resident visiting Truscott last week was surprised to see so much acreage in wheat and so little in cotton. Cotton is no longer king here. The two gins are gone and have been for many years, although the gin at Gilliland operates. Low cotton prices, shortage of labor and high production costs have caused the change. With wheat prices the lowest in many years, farmers may start looking for another crop.

### E. Kenner Died Last Thursday in Austin Hospital

E. (Eskridge) Kenner, 68, lifetime resident of Foard County, and one of Texas' best-known antique auto enthusiasts, died about 2 p. m. Thursday of last week in an Austin hospital after suffering an apparent heart attack in his hotel room.

Mr. Kenner was in Austin to participate in the 15th annual All-Texas Antique Auto Tour. He had missed only one of the tours since the association was organized—the 14th annual tour—after suffering an earlier heart attack.

Accompanied to Austin by Henry Greening, Mr. Kenner was in Austin at the time of his death with his 1913 Model T Ford touring car, which he had rebuilt and with which he had won many trophies over the years in antique auto competition. He was once honored by All-Texas Tour members with a special plaque proclaiming him "Mr. Tour Member, Himself."

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Saturday at the First Christian Church, of which he was a member, with former Minister Paul Manning of Dallas and Minister R. C. McCord officiating. Burial was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

**Change in Law to Permit More Children to Get S. S. Benefits**

More children will qualify for social security benefits under recent change in the law, according to Edwin Draughon, manager of the Vernon Social Security office. Mr. Draughon explained the 1967 amendments require payment to children when their mother died. No longer is it necessary that she had earned credit by the law during the 3-year period just before death.  
 "This change," Mr. Draughon said, "is not limited to where death occurs in 1967 or later. Children whose mother died as long as 21 years ago could be eligible for payments now. Those who think they may be affected by this change in the law should get in touch with our office to meet with the representative when he comes to the community center in Crowell."

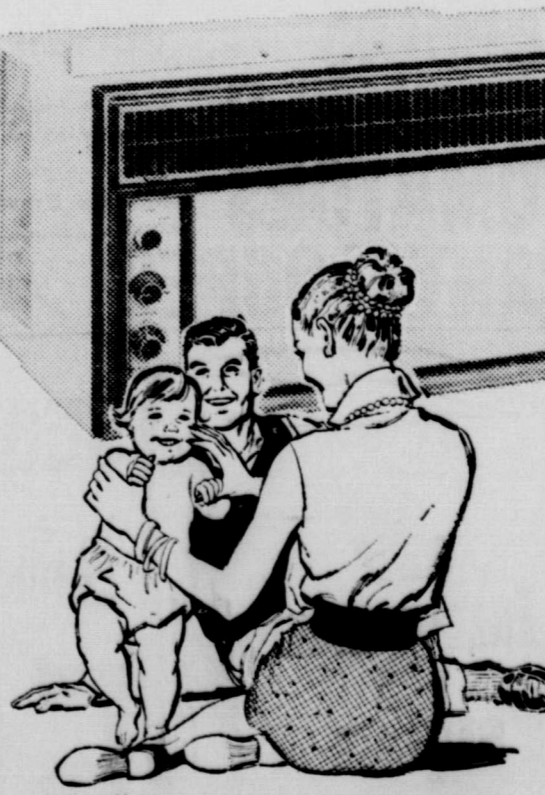

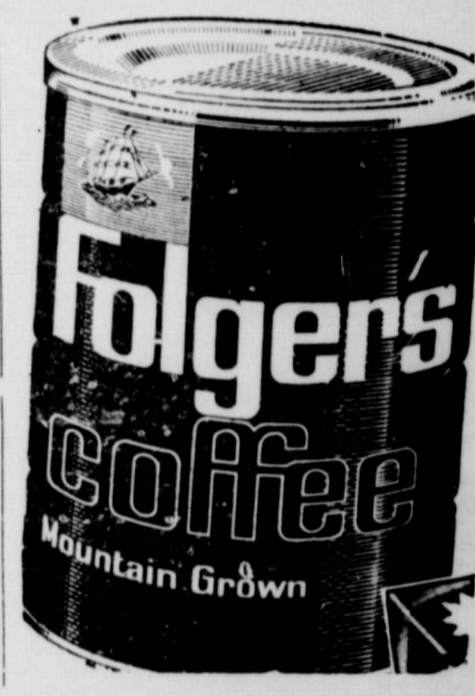

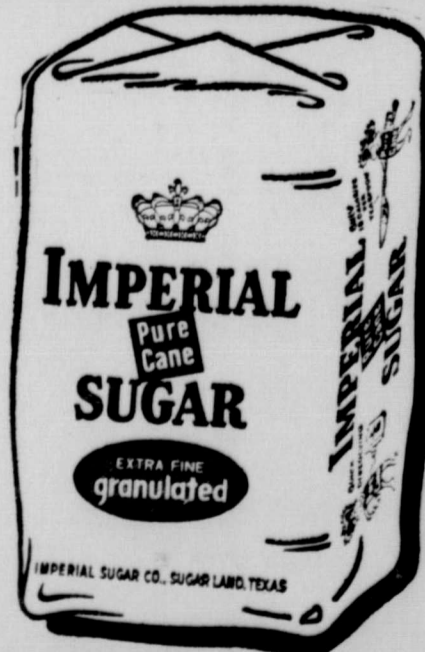

STATE  
**Capital NEWS**  
BY VERN DANFORD

Austin, Tex.—Sitting in special  
session to approve appropriations  
and tax bills for the fiscal year  
beginning September 1, the House  
and Senate began deliberations  
on how to distribute some \$2,500-  
000,000 in appropriations.

When that little problem is tak-  
en care of, the Legislature will  
worry about one that's potentially  
more disastrous, politically. Rais-  
ing taxes or passing new ones  
comes next. They must raise the  
\$125-130,000,000 difference be-  
tween what the state will have  
and what it will need.

Gov. John Connally's special  
session opened on schedule June  
4 in a story-book setting: The  
newly-elected Democratic nominee  
for governor, Lt. Gov. Preston  
Smith, presided over the Senate,  
and the newly-elected Democratic  
nominee for lieutenant governor,  
Speaker Ben Barnes, held the  
House controls.

Governor Connally spelled out  
basically this tax program:  
• A one-per-cent raise in the  
state sales tax rate to three per  
cent with the bulk of the increase  
going to cities. Sales tax base  
would be extended to cover cig-

arettes, other tobacco products,  
and such services as haircuts and  
beauty treatments, laundry and  
dry cleaning, repairs, telephone  
and telegraph, and auto parking  
(75,800,000).

• A \$3,200,000 cut in taxes  
on the gross receipts of telephone  
companies was incorporated in  
his recommendations, same being  
more than offset by the inclusion  
of telephone service in the three  
per cent sales tax.

• A boost in the auto sales  
tax rate to three per cent (\$30-  
600,000).

• Legalization of liquor-by-the-  
drink in small bottles, with each  
bottle individually taxed, and pri-  
vate clubs assessed a 10 per cent  
gross receipts tax (\$14,500,000).

• Transfer of \$7,500,000 from  
the operators and chauffeurs li-  
cense fund to the general fund  
spending pocket.

• A realty transfer stamp tax  
(\$1,000,000).

Initial reaction to the \$127-  
200,000 package was generally  
cool or downright unfriendly, al-  
though many legislators were  
plainly waiting to see what the  
folks back home thought of it.

Outlook was dimmest of all for  
the mini-bottle bill. Even many  
liquor-by-the-drink advocates didn't  
like it, but they admitted that  
from their standpoint it was "bet-  
ter than nothing." Hearings on  
it were started this week by com-  
mittees of both the House and  
the Senate.

House revenue and tax commit-  
tee is considering Connally's om-  
nibus tax bill. Speaker Barnes,  
who is not committed to the Con-  
nally proposals, apparently will  
put them to a floor vote in the  
House next week unless something  
better is substituted.

Barnes warned that \$150,000-  
000 in new revenue may be nee-  
ded if a federal income tax sur-  
charge is passed by congress,  
slashing purchasing power and  
thereby cutting the state's sales  
tax take.

After all tax items are taken  
care of, Connally has promised  
to open the legislative hopper to  
such other issues as the lawmak-  
ers desire—if there's time left in  
the 30-day special session.

**LIQUOR LAW REVISION** —  
Core of the Legislature's revision  
of the Liquor Control Act prob-  
ably will be the recommendations  
of the liquor-law-revision sub-  
committee of the House State  
Affairs Committee. Speaker  
Barnes turned the problem over  
to the sub-committee during the  
LCB controversy.

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria,  
chairman of the sub-committee  
and the full committee, reported  
to the committee on the first day  
of the session, and the reaction  
indicated that one major problem  
could be whether to allow posses-  
sion of alcoholic beverages and  
private clubs in dry areas.

Rep. Jake Johnson of San An-  
tonio, a supporter of liquor-by-  
the-drink, asked the committee  
to reject the sub-committee's report  
because it did not include those  
prohibitions, which he thinks  
would provide incentive for liq-  
uor-by-the-drink.

Cory, however, closed the meet-  
ing before Johnson could get the  
record vote he sought.

Committee report included 31  
points, many of them recommen-  
dations to change the law.

Main recommendations included  
prohibiting legislators from prac-  
ticing before the LCB; opening  
all LCB records on violations and  
complaints to the public; a mini-  
mum of 50 members for a private  
club; a fine for parents whose  
children are convicted on liquor  
violations twice; immediate sale  
of confiscated liquor; increasing  
LCB agents' salaries; and provid-  
ing graduated penalties for re-  
peated liquor violations.

## A DAY TO PAUSE

(The following editorial appeared in the Sunday, June 9, edition of The Dallas Morning News.)

The President has proclaimed today a national day of mourning for the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

This is appropriate, but in a bigger sense today is a time to pause and reflect on what this country was, what it is and the course it should follow tomorrow.

This is a "time of tragedy and common anguish," President Johnson commented. The question for us all to asked ourselves is, Why?

The real tragedy is a lack of respect for authority, a discouragingly cynical attitude toward our institutions, a decline in integrity and personal honor and a laxity which has brought the nation to its knees in lawlessness.

The government itself must bear part of the blame for "common anguish" and national shock. Its highest court has made enforcement of the law most difficult. It permits 3,000 people to mar public property while making unruly demands—yet refuses to let peaceful Baptists march down the street on a Sunday afternoon.

Minorities and pressure groups get attentive ears, while the majority who are obedient and pay heavily to the Treasury are accorded only casual consideration. Let us pause to reflect on these virtues and time-tested virtues that gave us a common sense of purpose: Personal discipline, sacrifice, honor and integrity, obedience to authority, individual and national respect, religious faith and a willingness to struggle for noble aspirations.

The late Sen. Kennedy was striving for what he called a "new course," but he was not unmindful of these qualities which had enabled his country.

Out of national shock and tragedy, there often come new resolves. We cannot go on without a "new course" or a new purpose.

Nothing good ever came from the lawless. The ballot cannot give way to the bullet. The assassins of what is good and noble must pay the price of their evil deeds. We cannot tolerate those who admit no authority, except their own capricious will.

So, this day of mourning should also be a day of reflection and new resolves. Individually and collectively, this nation must right itself on the track which leads to higher ground. That is the "new course." That is the new purpose. We can proceed no other way.

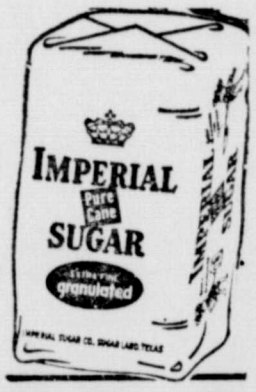
