Burial in Crowell Cemetery for Retired Baptist Minister

Rev. Charles Albert Powell, age 84, died Tuesday, July 2, at 9 a. m. at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene following a long illness.

Funeral services were held Friday, July 5, at 10 a. m. from the University Baptist Church in Abilene with the pastor, Rev. John DeFore, officiating. Graveside rites were held at 3 p. m. Friday at the Crowell Cemetery. Officiating for the graveside rites was Rev. Bill Norman, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Quanah. Arrangements were under direction of Smith Funeral Home of Knox City.

One-Car Accident Claims Life of 16-Year-Old Girl, Betty Woodard

Miss Betty Louise Woodard, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Woodard of Crowell, was killed in a one-car accident about two miles north of Crowell on State Highway 283. The fatal mishap occurred about 12:30 a. m. Sunday.

Funeral services for the Crowell High School senior were held at 4 p. m. Monday from the Bethel Church conducted by the pastor, Rev. Warren Everson. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Pall bearers were Dick Todd, Milton Hunter, Bill Foster, Buddy Chapman, Glen Shook and Guy Todd.

Miss Woodard was born July 9, 1951, here in Crowell. She was a member of the Crowell High School girls' basketball and volleyball teams, a member of the Crowell Trail Riders, and would have been a senior at CHS this fall.

Survivors include her parents; one sister, Judy, of the home; and grandfather, Allie Martin of California.

According to reports from investigating officers, the 1957 model car driven by Miss Woodard went out of control as she approached the highway from the east on a farm road. The vehicle crossed the highway and came to a stop across the road in a pasture west of the highway.

Texas Highway Patrolmen Presley Thomson and Stanley Hill of Quanah investigated the accident.

LOCAL BANK DEPOSITS OVER \$4 MILLION

In spite of the depressed price of cotton this harvest season, the high production figure for Foard County this year was reflected in the bank statement of the Crowell State Bank this week which showed over \$1 million increase in deposits over a year ago.

Deposits at the close of business June 29, 1968, were \$4,089,773.41 and on June 30, 1967, the deposits totaled \$2,943,702.75.

Two years ago deposits totaled \$2,803,373.48, and the June, 1968, deposits are nearly the same as four years ago when they totaled \$4,028,430.81. Three years ago at this time, deposits were \$3,110,144.16.
