### Otilio Castro to Resign as Hospital Grounds Keeper

After twenty-three years of maintaining the grounds around the Foard County Hospital in an impeccable manner, Otilio Castro announced this week that he is resigning from the job at the end of this month due to illness. It was in 1945, that Mr. Castro, assisted by his wife, took on the full-time job of keeping the hospital grounds. All during these years, the grounds have been a show-place, always neatly trimmed, and with some sort of flowers blooming in the beds most of the growing season. He and his wife kept the grounds watered, the grass mowed, and trimmed by hand the grass next to the sidewalks and curbs. Mr. and Mrs. Castro have also kept the yard at the Medical & Surgical Clinic across the street north of the hospital ever since it was built. In announcing that his health forced him to resign, Mr. Castro expressed the appreciation of his wife and himself for the many courtesies extended them by the hospital board, staff and doctors. He added, "My wife and I have always been happy to keep the grounds as we felt a pretty yard around the hospital might brighten the day for those who were patients there."

### No Major Cuts Due in Crowell Postal Service

#### Only Change Will Be in Saturday Morning Hours

Postmaster Ted Reeder said this week that the curtailment in services on a nation-wide basis by the Post Office Department will have only a small effect on Crowell's second class postoffice. Only change reported by Mr. Reeder will be that the post office will be closed on Saturday, except for the general delivery window which will be open for two hours during the morning. Reeder said that the tentative schedule for Saturday morning is for the general delivery window to be open from 9 to 11 a. m. This new change goes into effect on Saturday, July 27. For years, the local post office has been open from 8 until 12 noon on Saturday.

## FOARD COUNTY TO HAVE 84-DAY QUAIL SEASON

The interest in hunting in Texas took a big step forward last week as the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted new regulations.

As a result of an application made last year, Foard County is now in the second year as a member of the Panhandle Regulatory District and the seasons as announced by the commission for the Panhandle district are as follows:

**Quail season will be between Nov. 9 and Jan. 31 except in Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Hall and Motley Counties where the season will be Dec. 1 through Jan. 31. Bag limit of quail is 12 per day and 36 in possession. Quail seasons and bag limits for Hardeman, Hemphill and Lamb Counties are determined by statute.**

**Deer season will be Nov. 30 through Dec. 15 with a bag limit of 1 deer—either buck or antlerless. However, antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.**

**Turkey may be taken between Nov. 30 and Dec. 15 with a bag limit of 1 turkey per season, either sex.**

**Dove Season**  
The mourning dove season in the north zone (which includes Foard County) will be held for 60 consecutive half-days beginning on Sept. 1 through Oct. 30. Bag limits for mourning doves will be 12 per day and 24 in possession. Shooting hours will be 1 p. m. to Central Daylight Saving Time, to sunset each day.

## Cathy McLain to Attend Farm Bureau Seminar

One high school student from this county will attend the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar July 30-August 3 on the campus of Baylor University in Waco, according to Glenn Jones, President of the Foard County Farm Bureau.

The student is Miss Cathy McLain daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton McLain of Crowell. She will be a senior in Crowell High School this term.

The annual training school for high school junior and senior students is an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage and the proper role of government, according to Mr. Jones.

"It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make their roles as citizens more meaningful," the local farm leader said.

The county Farm Bureau sponsors the local students by paying their tuition, room and board, and transportation to and from Waco. Travel is by chartered bus. A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar.

Four nationally known lecturers will address the 1968 school. They are Dr. Clifton L. Ganus, president of Harding College, Seary, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Kay, president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia," and W. Cleon Skousen, author, lawyer, and former FBI agent.

Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral, and social aspects of American society. Instructions will consist of lectures, films and panel discussions.

## Two Minutes With the Bible

**When the Lord Asked Why**

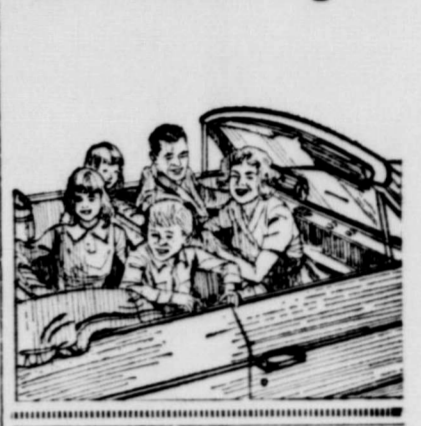

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Austin, Tex.—Texas Liquor Control Board is studying new regulations for private clubs where "spirits" are sold. Members won't reveal the recommendations that were submitted to them by Acting Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr. until after careful study. Last set of regulations banning cash sales in the clubs and curbing the issuance of guest cards by manager-members was knocked out by a district court order in May. Humphreys termed the new rules "workable" but "not rigid." Meanwhile, he submitted a long report on the steps taken to restore public confidence in the LCB which has been hard hit on investigation of irregularities. Humphreys detailed steps taken to upgrade personnel and improve administration, case handling and record keeping. At their July 18 meeting, the board also:

● Approved retirement for LCB Enforcement Chief A. R. Cartledge and named as his temporary replacement Don Fishell, 39.

● Announced that a permanent successor to resigned Administrator Coke Stevenson Jr. will be appointed in 30 to 60 days.

● Acknowledged that Stevenson told members he had received an expensive watch as a gift but they did not question his acceptance of it.

● Reported law enforcement activities and collections are on a substantial increase over last year.

"The future looks good," commented Chairman W. D. Noel of Odessa, who is scheduled to step down soon after 16 years of service.

**TAX BILL LAW**—Now there's no way out of paying those new taxes approved by the Legislature in special session. Gov. John Connally has signed into law the bill which is designed to raise \$160.2 million for 1969 state operations. It's effective October 1 and here's what it does:

● Raises the general sales and auto sales tax rates from two to three per cent statewide. In cities which levy 1 per cent local option sales taxes, the rate will be four per cent (No change was made in exemptions.)

● Increases the corporation franchise tax rate (collectible May 1) from \$2.25 to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of taxable capital, surplus and undivided profits. Portion of the franchise tax on corporate debt will be reduced from \$2.25 to \$2.00 in 1969 and phased out by 1973.

**TOURIST RECORD IN MAKING**—Tourist travel is expected to far surpass all previous records this year, according to State Highway Department's travel and information division soundings.

One Highway Department travel bureau on Interstate Highway 10 near Orange reported "customers" for first half of 1968 more than doubled total for January-June, 1967. Ninety per cent of the visitors were on their way to the HemisFair in San Antonio.

All eight established bureaus run by the Highway Department reported big increases. Total services went up 14.2 per cent for the first half of this year compared with the same period in 1967. Travel and information division said its mail inquiries are up 27 per cent.

Last year Texas was visited by 20.6 million persons who spent \$1.2 billion. This was an eight per cent increase in visitors over 1966, and an 11 per cent jump in spending.

**COURTS SPEAK**—Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has urged the U. S. Supreme Court to re-consider its decision that the Texas tidelands boundaries must be measured from 10.3 miles of shoreline

as it existed in 1845, without regard to recessions.

State Supreme Court reversed an \$862,000 verdict favoring foreign car dealers. They had sued the city of Houston for flood damage to autos, claiming inadequate drainage.

High court set October 16 for review of the lower court orders directing a charter be granted to Mission Savings and Loan Association, San Antonio.

It ordered a new trial in a Hansford County landowner's suit against a professional wheat cutter whose truck started a fire in his field.

### Former Resident of Thalia Killed in Wichita Falls

A former Thalia resident, Mrs. Mary Jo Hasselvander, 36, of Wichita Falls was shot to death at her home Tuesday night of last week, and her husband, Jack Hasselvander, critically wounded, died Wednesday morning in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Wichita Falls officers said the double shooting followed a family argument. Wichita Falls police confirmed that Mr. Hasselvander had purchased a German-made revolver Tuesday afternoon.

A 12-year-old daughter told officers she heard a shot while watching television, went into a bedroom where she found her mother lying on the floor, then ran to a neighbor's house.

A weapon was found on a kitchen table at the home with all six cartridges fired.

Mrs. Hasselvander, an employee of Scott Manufacturing Company at Wichita Falls, was born Aug. 27, 1931, at Thalia. She attended Thalia schools and was graduated from Crowell High School in 1948.

She and Mr. Hasselvander were married in Vernon in October, 1948, and had been living in Wichita Falls for about 20 years.

Funeral services for Mrs. Hasselvander were conducted at the First Baptist Church in Vernon at 10:30 a. m. Friday with Rev. Dudley Bragg, pastor of Faith Baptist Church of Wichita Falls, officiating. Burial was in Wilbar Memorial Park under the direction of Sullivan Funeral Home.

Services for Hasselvander were held at 3:30 p. m. Thursday from Owens & Brumley Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. J. F. Patton, secretary and treasurer of Mississippi Assembly of God Churches, officiating. Burial was in Rosemont Cemetery.

## Local Teacher to Attend Special 3-Week Institute

Nationally recognized authorities in the field of special education will be in Wichita Falls July 29-Aug. 16 in connection with a three-week institute to train teachers for mentally retarded children. A special meeting to which the public is invited has been slated.

Mrs. Carmon Welch of the Crowell School system will be attending the 3-week school.

Guest speakers include Dr. William G. Wolfe and Dr. John R. Peck, both from the University of Texas. Dr. Peck will address a public meeting on "The Community's Commitment to the Mentally Retarded," at 7:30 p. m., Thursday, Aug. 8, at the cafeteria of San Jacinto School, 413 Bluff.

The institute is being sponsored by Region IX Education Service Center in cooperation with the university and will offer special training to 50 teachers from the 12-County North Central Texas area. It is made possible through a \$24,650 federal grant and ushers in the first phase of a continuing training program for special education teachers, planned with anticipated additional federal and state funds.

Dr. Wolfe and Peck head a contingent of educators who compose the faculty of the institute.

Dr. Wolfe is chairman of the department of special education, College of Education, at the University of Texas. He is known for his work on behalf of exceptional children. He is a fellow in the American Academy for Cerebral Palsy, in the American Speech and Hearing Association, and in the American Psychological Association.

A former vice president of the United Cerebral Palsy Association he headed the state organization in 1958-61. Dr. Wolfe will speak to teachers and school district representatives the second afternoon workshop session Tuesday, July 30, starting at 1 p. m.

Dr. Peck, the university's authority in the field of mental retardation, is the author of three books concerning this area.

Currently, he serves on the professional advisory committee of the information, education, and referral branch of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. He is a consultant to the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health.

Giving the opening day orientation address at the workshop will be Dr. Charles Meigs, coordinator of special education administration at the University of Texas. Teachers for the demonstration class at the institute will be Mrs. Francis Christenson and Mrs. Jane Denbow of Wichita Falls.

Members of the institute faculty also include Mrs. Venedia Watkins, project coordinator of the Region VII Education Service Center at Kilgore; James Law and Mrs. Mary Robinson, consultants from Texas Education Agency; Mrs. Margaret H. Booker, field director of the Special Educational

Instructional Materials Center at Austin; and from Region IX, the assistant director, James A. Hefter; and David A. Bocher, director of media services.

Project coordinator is James R. Hale of the Region IX Center and the Division of Extension, UT.

The instructional materials center will offer a special display of teaching aids during the institute on Monday, Aug. 12, from 8:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. and from 1 to 3:30 p. m.

## Court Rejects Regulation Under Herbicide Law

The Commissioners Court of Foard County decided at a meeting Monday not to bring this county under the jurisdiction of the herbicide law, County Judge Leslie Thomas said Monday afternoon.

Only 13 people appeared at the hearing before the Commissioners Court to consider whether Foard County should be brought under the control of the law.

Charlie Chapman, Assistant Texas State Commissioner of Agriculture, met with the court and those present to discuss at length the provisions of the law and the regulations that would become effective if the county were controlled. The hearing was advertised in response to complaints by a number of farmers in the county as to the damage being inflicted by herbicidal spraying without regulation, Judge Thomas said.

If controls were effective, it would cost the landowner 10 cents per acre for a permit for spraying in excess of ten acres, and would have required the custom aerial or other applicator to be bonded and/or carry insurance as to his operations.

Of the 13 present, 11 voted against controls where 1 voted for controls and 1 did not vote; hence, the court rejected the regulation, Judge Thomas added.

## Tabulation Made on World War I Debts Still Owed to U. S.

"The Treasury Department has completed a tabulation of the debt still owed the United States by World War I debtor nations. As of the end of the fiscal year last June thirtieth, this debt had increased \$324 million in interest and stood at \$21,352,854,709. Only little Finland made any payments last year, \$185,000 towards principal and \$167,982 in interest. The others made no payment... The government of the United States had to borrow the money in the first place. And the taxpayers of this country have to pay interest on the government loans, even if debtor nations do not."—Walden, N. Y., Citizen Herald.
