#### Game Arrests Up over Last Year's

Arrests for game, fish and wat er safety violations in July to taled 1,332, a 3.9 per cent increase over the 1,282 citations

issued in July, 1967. The most numerous arrests were made for water safety violations. Of the 631 total, 375 citations were for failure to have a Coast guard approved life saving device for each person in the boat. There were 112 citations for operating a motor board without registra-

tion on board. Fishing violations totaled 614 with 574 of these being fishing without a license.

Hunting violations numbered 69 with the most numerous being for discharging a firearm on a public road, hunting without a license, killing or possession of deer in closed season, and hunting at

There were 18 commercial fishing violations.

Fines and court costs accrued to the state were \$19,820.92.

#### **Texas Community Property Law Affects Income Tax Owed**

The Texas Community Property law creates quite a few differences in the income tax you owe. One of the surprises is the fact that both halves of the community property estate are re-evaluated as of the date of death.

To illustrate how this works grandpaw and grandmaw bought a 1000-acre ranch in 1920, for \$1,000. Under the community property law of Texas, if they sold the ranch in 1967, grandpaw had a \$500 basis for his half and grandmaw had a \$500 basis for her half. In 1948 they struck oil on the ranch, and shortly before grandpaw's death in 1968 an engineering appraisal placed \$1,000,000 value on the ranch The Crude Oil Company offered them \$1,000,000 for the property but grandpaw decided not to sell even though they could take a capital gain, they would owe about \$250,000 taxes, since they only had a \$1,000 basis. Grandpaw died on May 1, 1968. His half of the property went to their children but grandmaw still owns her half However, on December 1, grandmaw decides to take the Crude Oil offer of \$500,000 for her property. She does not owe any income taxes. Naturally there wil be an estate tax on the \$500,000 value of grandpaw's property. The effects of the community property law have become far more important in recent years, since the value of most property has increased a great deal during the life span of the owner.
