## SHERMAN MC BEATH PROMOTED TO LIQUOR CONTROL BOARD

Sherman McBeath of Wichita Falls, who has been with the Texas Liquor Control Board for just over 11 years, last week was named to the second highest position in the state organization.

He was named assistant chief of enforcement for the entire state for the Liquor Control Board. Mr. McBeath will begin his new duties in Austin about the middle of this month.

Mr. McBeath has risen fast in the ranks of the LCB, having first been employed by the state in July, 1957. His first work for the board was in Wichita Falls where he was stationed until April, 1959, when he was moved to Vernon. Promoted to assistant district supervisor in September, 1961, he was transferred to Amarillo and was stationed there until his promotion to district supervisor in April, 1962, and transferral to Paris, where he made a name for himself for his work in arresting moonshiners in that area. He was stationed in Paris until August, 1967, when he transferred to Wichita Falls as district supervisor, a post he held at the time of his latest promotion.

A Foard County native and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McBeath, Sr. of Thalia, McBeath began his law enforcement career as deputy under Foard County Sheriff J. L. Gobin. This was in January 1952, and he was elected Foard County sheriff in 1955 and served as sheriff until 1956 when he resigned to become deputy sheriff of Wichita County. He served there until going to work for the LCB.

McBeath's most recent promotion was announced by acting administrator of the Liquor Control Board, O. N. Humphreys, Jr.

McBeath's wife is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Bartley of Crowell and the couple have two children, Malinda and Sidney Rhea.

## Results Compiled on Wheat Fertilizer Demonstrations on Whitfield Land

A wheat fertilizer demonstration was established in Foard County on October 14, 1967, by County Agricultural Agent Joe Burkett, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, Superintendent of the Chillicothe Experiment Station.

This was a dry land wheat fertilizer demonstration and was located on the Jesse Whitfield farm northeast of Crowell.

Following are the complete results of this demonstration. The first column is the amount of actual nitrogen, phosphorous, or potassium applied per acre. The second column is the actual yield in bushels per acre.

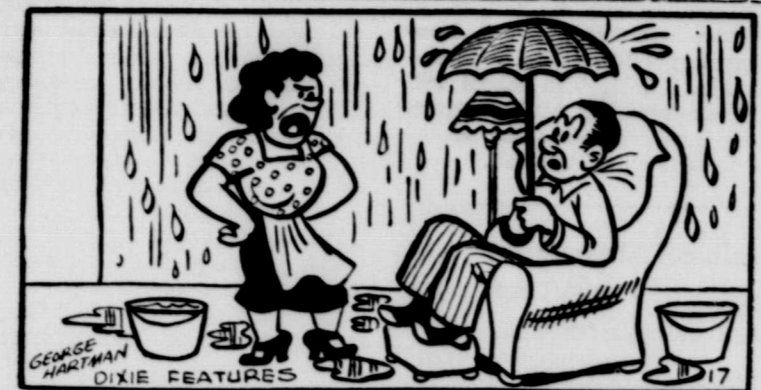
The club had its first practice session Monday, Sept. 9, at 6:30 p. m. The girls practiced new yells and routines.
