First Lieutenant Norman Lee Naron recently was awarded the Army Commendation Medal at Fort Sill, Okla., for outstanding service while serving as platoon leader, Battery C, and as executive officer, Battery D, 6th Training Battalion, 1st Advanced Individual Training Brigade, United States Army Training Center, Field Artillery.

The citation accompanying the medal read as follows: "Lieutenant Naron consistently demonstrated outstanding professional competence, technical knowledge, and personal excellence. Through his mature judgment and tact, combined with his efficiency and congenial manner, he earned the respect and admiration of all those with whom he came in contact. His initiative, enthusiasm, and willingness to assume additional responsibility enabled him to contribute materially to the successful accomplishment of his battalion's overall mission. First Lieutenant Naron's exemplary performance of duty reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

Lt. Naron is now on orders for service in Vietnam. He will report to San Francisco October 16 and arrive in Vietnam by the 18th to be assigned for duty upon arrival.

EOAC Nominated for National Research Project

Winner of Grant
to Receive \$150,000
for Poverty Research

The Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation has received word from the field representative of Region 5 Office of Economic Opportunity that the local unit has been nominated from all rural Community Action Agencies in Texas for a research and development project. Don Ross Malone, executive secretary, said this week.

There will be seven nominations from the seven regions of the United States. Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico comprise the southwest region from which this nomination comes. Of the 49 nominations submitted by the 7 regions of the United States, 25 will be accepted to submit competitive applications for grants of \$150,000 per year for two years to do research and development in the rural areas focusing on causes, conditions and remedies of rural poverty.

Of the 25 selected, seven will be approved for a \$150,000 grant. If, after the first year, progress has been made, another grant of \$150,000 will be extended.

"We are privileged to have been the number one nominee for the State of Texas," Mr. Malone said, "and we are looking forward to the competition involved in getting this research project. We feel that research activities will be an excellent complement to our existing operations. We extend our thanks to the board of directors, the staff, and all the interested people who have made this nomination possible."

WILDCATS WIN 33-6 OVER LOCKETT PANTHERS IN SEASON OPENER

The Crowell Wildcat football team made its 1968 debut here last Friday night by trouncing the Lockett Panthers 33 to 6 in a non-conference contest.

Leading the Wildcat attack in this season-opener were tailback Billy Hord who scored four touchdowns, kicked two extra points and did a great job backing the line on defense; fullback Charles Dodd did a sensational job of blocking for Hord, and on his own TD, literally knocked a defender across the end zone; Terry Bird, guard, who blocked a Panther punt to start the Wildcats on one TD journey, and threw some key blocks; Jim Tom (Frog) Smith, center, blocked well on the traps, intercepted one pass, and saved a touchdown by Lockett when he emerged from the congestion on the Crowell 3-yard line with the football; Ken Sellers, tall sophomore split end, who went to quarterback on a play or two, and ran the ball through a broken field to set up Dodd's TD. End Larry Ellis looked good bringing down Lockett's quarterback on one occasion on an attempted pass play; and Jimmy Hammonds and Ike Everson were also tough on defense. Guiding Crowell's offense was quarterback Gary Cates.

The Lockett youngsters seemed to be very nervous at the start of the game, fumbling on about the second play from scrimmage and Crowell was on its way to the first TD. The scoring effort required six plays from the Lockett 25 with Hord crossing the double stripe and also kicking the extra point.

Lockett, however, came right back and scored. They had three fast boys in their backfield: John Reese, Johnny Dorsey and quarterback Mike Chavis, who was poison on the quarterback keepers. Chavis scored with 2:12 left in the first quarter, with the try for two points failing.

With 4:20 left in the first half, Hord scored again, this time from one yard out. He also kicked the PAT to leave the halftime score 14-6.

Just at the beginning of the third quarter, Hord charged through a large hole made by a terrific block by Dodd, and broke into the open for a 67-yard TD gallop. The try for point-after failed.

Hord scored again with exactly one minute left in the third quarter from 9 yards out. The try for extra point was blocked.

The fourth quarter featured Dodd running the ball for the Wildcats and he scored his touchdown with 3:15 left in the game.

Larry Kieschnick was a stand-out on both offense and defense for the Panthers. He was one of the leading ground gainers for the Panthers and picked off one interception on defense. Ronnie Holland, Albert Switzer, Ricky Byars and Gene Bachman turned in strong performances on defense for the Panthers.

Other boys seeing action for the Wildcats were Gary Eddy, George Eavenson, Allen Lee, Leslie Hopkins, Junior Carroll, Buz Rasberry and Barry Branch.

Soil Conservation Office Here May Be Eliminated

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

We request the immediate help of all friends of Conservation and Agriculture in general. Unless Congress is persuaded to change present plans, employment and expenditure limitations will force the Soil Conservation Service to close field offices in at least 150 Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Fifteen to twenty of these offices would be in Texas. In the 6 Soil and Water Conservation Districts (10 counties) around Vernon there are 12 farmers and ranchers who signed Great Plains Conservation contracts over a year ago and whose contracts still have not been funded. Many of these men have completed several thousand dollars worth of conservation work under the assumption their contract would be funded shortly after July 1, 1968. This cut may delay the funding of their contracts another year.

Below are the names and addresses of our Senators and Congressmen. We of the Wilbarger Soil and Water Conservation District believe very strongly that to hamper conservation efforts is false economy. If you agree please let our representatives know how you feel. Urge them to get on record in favor of re-authorizing the SCS to spend the money already appropriated by Congress for the 1969 fiscal year.

I am attaching a sheet listing the suspected impact of employment and expenditure limitations. Use only the information that you are most vitally interested in when you contact your Senators and Congressmen.

President Johnson will address Congress and tell them how he plans to cut spending by \$6 billion shortly after they reconvene on September 4. He will leave the door open for the Congress to restore these cuts.

Below are the facts and figures relating to the matter:
When Congress re-convenes in September, President Johnson is expected to make public target-figures on government employment and expenditures through which he intends to achieve the \$6 billion reduction in expenditures and outlays during fiscal year 1969 as directed by Public Law 90-364, the Tax Surcharge and Expenditure Act.

He will ask USDA to reduce \$3/4 billion in spending and employ 1,335 fewer people than were employed on June 30, 1968. A drastic portion of this cut is scheduled to come out of the soil and water conservation program.

The target-figures on employment and expenditures for the Soil Conservation Service will grind conservation accomplishments to a halt in many districts. The target personnel ceiling for SCS . . .

. . . is nearly one thousand man years less than the number permitted by the 1969 Appropriation Act. 15,800 in 1969 appropriation act. 14,840 in target personnel ceiling.

. . . is 645 less than the positions proposed in the President's budget.

. . . is 625 less than the target set by Congress in Public Law 90-364.

. . . will require closing SCS field offices in at least 150 local conservation districts.

. . . will breach long-standing recruitment arrangements with state universities and graduating students.

The target limitation on SCS expenditures . . . will prohibit the letting of any new construction contracts in the upstream watershed program.

. . . will prohibit the letting of any new contracts for whole farm and ranch soil and water conservation in the Great Plains Conservation Program.

. . . will prohibit the letting of any new contracts for flood prevention.

. . . will result in the loss of many trained professional people from watershed and other community development activities.

. . . will slow down conservation operations and default long-standing memorandums of understanding and other commitments to local and state subdivisions of government by denying technical service.

NEEDED ACTION—Urge the Congress to exempt the Soil Conservation Service from personnel ceilings and spending limitations imposed by Public Law 90-364.

Treat the soil and water conservation program of America the same way the Congress treated the Post Office Department. Urge the Congress to re-authorize the SCS to spend the money already
