Sales during the first eight months totaled \$29,962.00 and this is 43 per cent of the 1967 goal of \$70,000.00. Sales in Texas during the month of August totaled \$14,390,299.00 which is an increase of 3.8 per cent over the same period of 1967. January-August sales reached a new high in the state totaling \$121,220,421.00—an increase of 8.2 per cent over January-August sales during 1967.

Named to served with Mrs. McDaniel were Mrs. Mattie L. Carroll, vice chairman; and Mrs. Sally Archer, secretary and treasurer. Leslie Thomas, who had served as interim chairman until a slate of officers was elected, presided at the meeting. Plans call for another meeting of the organization to be held soon, with as many interested citizens as will to attend, to make plans for a Red Cross fund drive, and other county activities of the local organization. Ray Shirley, who has been in charge of the Red Cross' program of service to military families all during the local chapter's period of inactivity, told of the various duties of that office. Mr. Shirley resigned from the job after years of faithful service. If Foard County residents are to benefit from the Red Cross blood program, it is imperative for the county to have an active Red Cross chapter. In addition to the blood program, there are many other programs needed in the county that can be obtained only through an active chapter. The Red Cross spent thousands of dollars helping Crowell residents following the tornado in 1942, and for a number of years Foard County residents expressed their gratitude for this help by being the first county in the nation to reach its Red Cross quota. However, the intervening years have seen a lapse of interest, and no drive of any kind has been made for the Red Cross here during the past two years. The newly-elected officers are hoping for the cooperation of all Foard County residents in re-activating the local chapter and keeping it an active organization.

# WILDCATS TAKE 41-6 WIN OVER MATADOR

The Crowell High School Wildcat football team capped its second win of the season last Friday night at Matador as they handed the Bullfighters a 41-6 defeat.

The first Wildcat score came with 1:33 left in the first quarter when Billy Hord gathered in a punt on his own 15, and with outstanding blocking, went the entire 85 yards. The try for extra points failed.

The first portion of the initial quarter saw both teams unable to move the ball with the Wildcats fumbling twice.

Charles Dodd, Wildcat fullback, crossed the double stripe for the Wildcats' second score. This TD was set up by a run by Hord to the Matador 43 and a Gary Cates to Kenneth Sellers pass which carried to the Matador 10. This second tally came with 4:33 left in the second quarter. Hord kicked the point-after.

The third Wildcat score came with only 39 seconds left in the half when another Cates-to-Sellers pass paid off for 6. Hord's kick was perfect and the Wildcats held a 20-0 halftime lead.

The Bullfighters scored their touchdown early in the third quarter on a Wildcat pass interception which was returned to the Wildcat 10. Former Crowell resident Mark Hill, son of Mr. and

Mrs. J. M. Hill of Matador, picked up 6 yards for the Bullfighters. They went on in for the TD with the try for extra points no good. Hord scored again from three yards out with 4:47 left in the third quarter; he also kicked the PAT to make the score 27-6.

Sellers then fielded a Matador punt and ran it all the way to the Matador 20 before being hauled down. The next play, Gary Eddy broke through the middle and went all the way untouched for another Wildcat tally.

The point-after try was good and this TD came with 2:43 left in the third quarter to make the score 33-6.

The Crowell bench was emptied for the remainder of the game, and with Ken Sellers quarterbacking the substitutes, the Wildcats scored their final touchdown of the night. The Wildcats were deep in their end of the field—on the 6—when Sellers broke around right end and raced 94 yards for the score. Speedy George Eavenson ran the two points, to make the final score 41-6.

Junior Urquiza intercepted a pass for the Wildcat subs; Mike Matus caught a pass, as did David Myers. Lee J. Whitley played about a quarter at QB.

## Greenbelt Authority Increases Water Rates; Crowell to Pay \$2 1/2¢ Per 1,000

To prevent a default of its bonds, the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority raised its rates to member cities at a meeting last week in Memphis.

The new rates, made effective September 1, 1968, will go through June 30, 1969, the fiscal year of the Authority.

New rates for Childress, Quanah, Clarendon and Hedley will be upped from 30 cents to 75 cents per 1,000 gallons.

No changes were made in the rates to the Red River Water Authority and Bestwall at Acme which were not represented at the meeting. Red River and Bestwall now pay 37 1/2 cents per 1,000 gallons.

What rate changes will be made in member cities will not be known until the city councils meet in the various cities.

Danny Burger of the Texas Water Development Board, which underwrote the bonds of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, forced the rate increase to keep the Greenbelt from defaulting.

Burger indicated that cities that might be behind in payments at the next accounting period, January 10, 1969, would be "overlooked" until the fiscal year closing in order to give time where time is needed.

## County Agent Reports Fever Ticks in Area

Fever ticks have been found outside the South Texas quarantine zone.

County Agent Joe Burkett said stockmen are asked to send a sample of ticks found on either cattle or horses to a regulatory laboratory for identification. The importance of the samples cannot be overemphasized and it is urgent that stockmen throughout the state cooperate.

Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, Third Floor, Western Republic Life Building, Austin, Texas 78701. A label or memorandum should accompany the sample listing the name of the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type of animal from which the tick or ticks were removed.

**Increased State Sales Tax Went into Effect Oct. 2**

Texans on Wednesday, October 2, began paying an additional one per cent sales tax, boosting the overall state rate to 3 per cent and rates in most cities to 4 per cent.

The new boost was approved by the special legislative session in June to balance the state's fiscal 1969 budget.

The new 3 per cent state tax will be in addition to any city levies, and most of the state's major cities have approved a local option 1 per cent tax.

A boost in the state corporate franchise tax also went into effect Wednesday, as did a hike in the motor vehicle sales tax.

The corporate franchise tax rate goes from \$2.25 per \$1,000 to \$2.75 per \$1,000. The motor vehicle sales tax, previously at 2 per cent like the general sales tax, rose to 3 per cent. It came in time to catch sales of new models of most new car makes. There will be no changes in exemptions under the state sales tax.

The taxes are expected to raise approximately \$160 million in revenue during the coming fiscal year.

The bill authorizing the new tax hikes called for the increases to become effective October 1, but since the laws do not go into effect until 90 days after the end of the legislative session, the effective date was pushed to Oct. 2. The special session adjourned July 3.

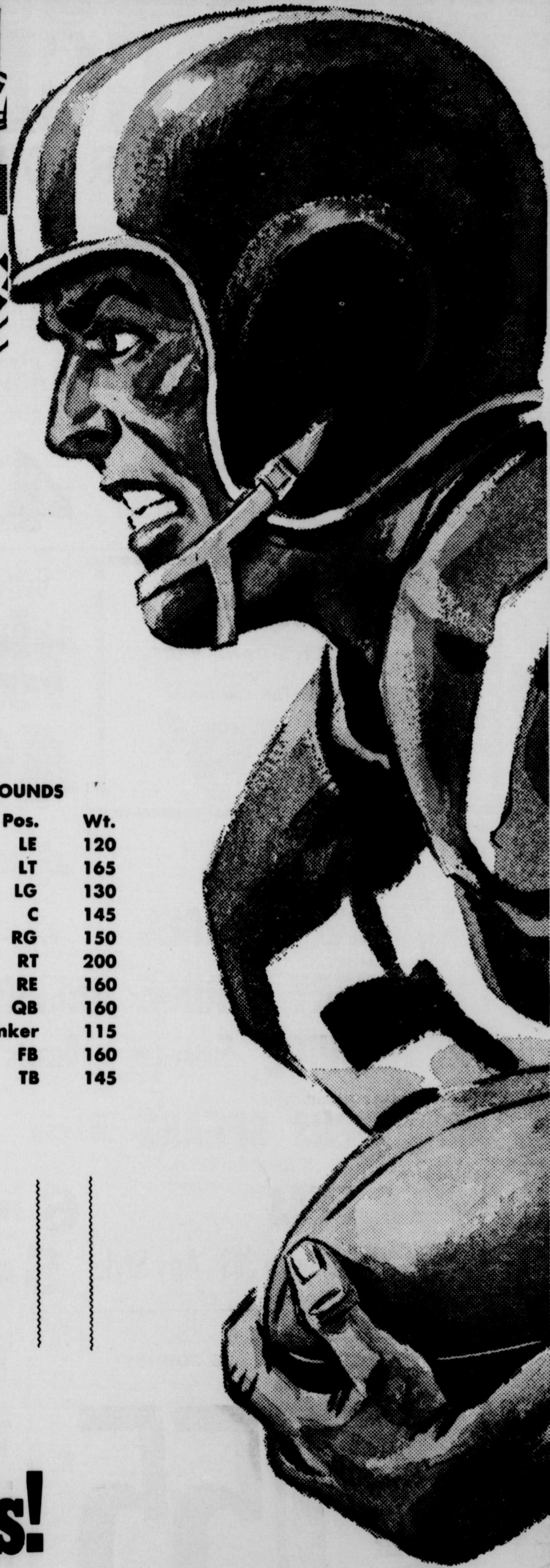
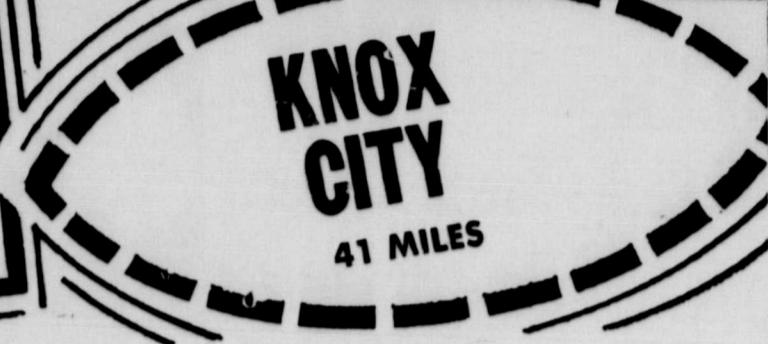

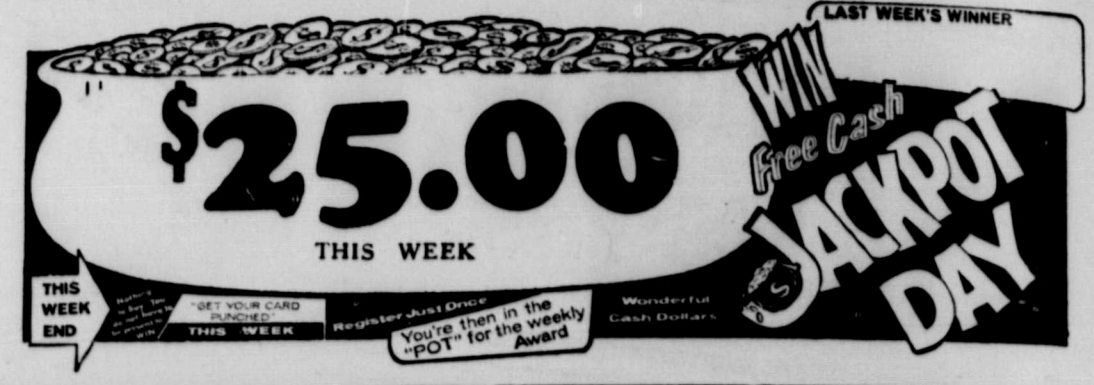

## Special Car Safety Program Slated for CHS Students

Students of Crowell High School will have an opportunity at 1:30 p. m., Tuesday, October 8, to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile gets, can and does, often lead into the danger zone and trouble, when they participate in a series of driving tests, Larry Jones, principal, announced this week.

The tests, which will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, assistant safety director, Texas Farm Bureau. The first section will be a short talk and film on traffic safety, while the second will be a demonstration on Logan Street, south of the school.

High point of the demonstration will come when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric detonator which is mounted on the front bumper of the car, will fire yellow paint bullets to indicate the distance required to stop the car in an emergency.

The driver being tested will be signalled to stop by the report of the first shell. The second will be fired automatically when the brake is applied, and the third when the car halts. Distance between the spots of paint will then be measured to determine the reaction, braking, and total stopping distances.

Tests will be limited to 20, 30 and 40 miles per hour speeds because of the danger of making emergency stops at higher speeds. Police officers will be used as drivers in the high speed tests.

As part of a program for safety on the highway, the Texas Farm Bureau's safety department presented this driving demonstration 876 times for 166,442 students in 202 different counties since 1957. The program is being brought to Crowell under the sponsorship of Foard County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend.

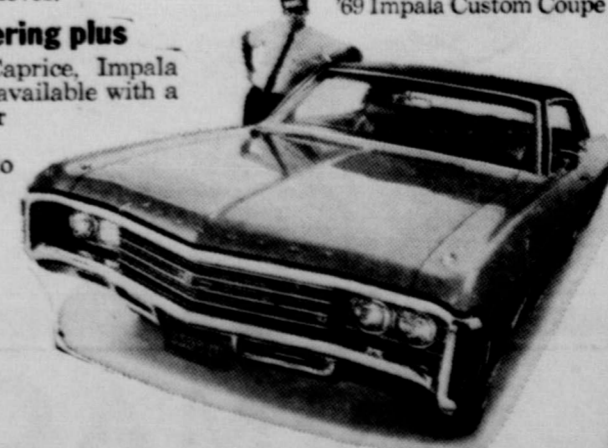
