The Greenbelt School of Vocational Nursing will hold its first graduation exercises on Saturday night, October 12, 1968, at 7:30 p. m. at the Crowell High School auditorium. Nineteen students from Crowell, Paducah, Quanah, Chillicothe and Vernon will receive diplomas after having attended school for one year. Supt. Henry Black will present the diplomas, and Mrs. Edith Roark, R. N., will present the class pins, which are being given to the students by the participating hospitals.

Miss Louise Krechak, RN, BSN, director of training for the State Board, Vocational Nurses, of Austin, will give the principal address and Mrs. Joretta Lumpkin of Quanah will give the valedictory address.

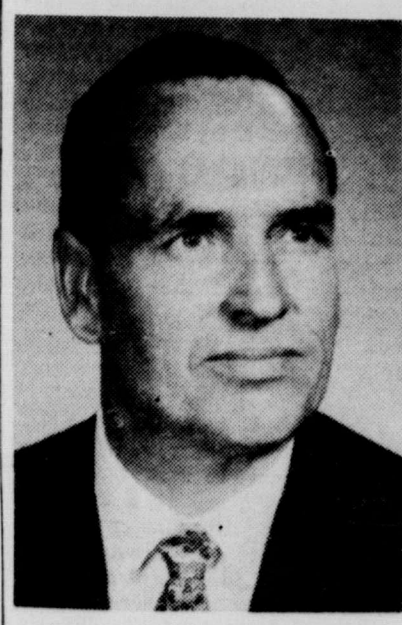

Foard County received a general rain last Friday night and early Saturday to break a dry

spell lasting for over 2 months. Official measurement here was 1.49 inches, and reports indicated that all of the county received at least that much, with some parts receiving up to 2 inches.

Plans Being Made for "Flea Market" Here October 19th

The Foard County Hobby Club is making plans for an old fashioned "flea market" to be held here on Saturday, October 19 at the city park, two blocks south of the stop light on highway 283.

Area residents are invited to "clean out your closets, cabinets, attic and garage, bring whatever you have to sell or trade. Something old or something new. The things you no longer want may be what someone else is looking for. So set up a table and join in the fun."

There will be a charge of \$1.00 per space and traders will furnish their own tables.

Homemade sweets, sandwiches, hot and cold drinks will be available all day.

This rain, which began about 11 p. m. Friday and lasted until about 7 a. m. Saturday was almost as much as was received here during the entire month of August—when 1.53 inches were recorded. It was about three times the total for September which saw only .45 inch of moisture during the entire month.

Thousands of acres of wheat in the county had been dry-sowed, and this moisture is sufficient to bring all this up. It will also be of great benefit to pastures which had suffered during the drought of the past few months.

This area received a light shower early Wednesday morning as a cold front moved through.

Wheat Fertilizer Demonstration Established Southwest of Crowell

A wheat fertilizer demonstration has been established in Foard County by County Agent Joe Burkett, in cooperation with Dr. Jim Mulkey, Supt. of the Chillicothe Experiment Station of Texas A&M University.

It is located on Jim Paul Norman's farm southwest of Crowell.

Eleven different rates and combinations of nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium fertilizers were used in the demonstration. Each of these rates and combinations were repeated four times in the demonstration.

Later in the year, these plots will be marked, showing the different rates and combinations of fertilizer used, so the wheat farmers and others interested can ob-

serve them. When the wheat is harvested, the yield will be figured for each rate and combination of fertilizer and the results made available to those who want it.

Complete information on this demonstration can be obtained from Norman, Burkett or Mulkey.

THIRTY YEARS AGO

News items below were taken from the Thursday, Oct. 13, 1938, issue of The Foard County News:

The WPA project calling for the widening of the right-of-way on State Highway 28 from Crowell west to the Cottle County line was started Wednesday morning. There are 83 workmen assigned to the project.

Over 1,200 bales of cotton have been ginned by the five gins in Foard County during the past week in spite of the day's lay-off on account of rain Monday.

Five Foard County youths were accepted for Civilian Conservation Corps service at the enrollment at Quannah last Saturday. Those accepted were Lendon Meadows, Lester Abston, Leonard Lewellen, Leo Sanders and Clarence Booker.

The District 10-B football spotlight will be focused on Crowell High School gridiron Friday night when two of the district's strongest teams, the Crowell Wildcats and Throckmorton Greyhounds, clash in a game that will probably have much to do with deciding the champions for 1938.

Eight-tenths of an inch of rain was received in Crowell Monday morning at which time a general rain fell over Foard County and broke an extended dry spell of about three months. This was the first precipitation to be recorded at the Crowell State Bank since July 17.

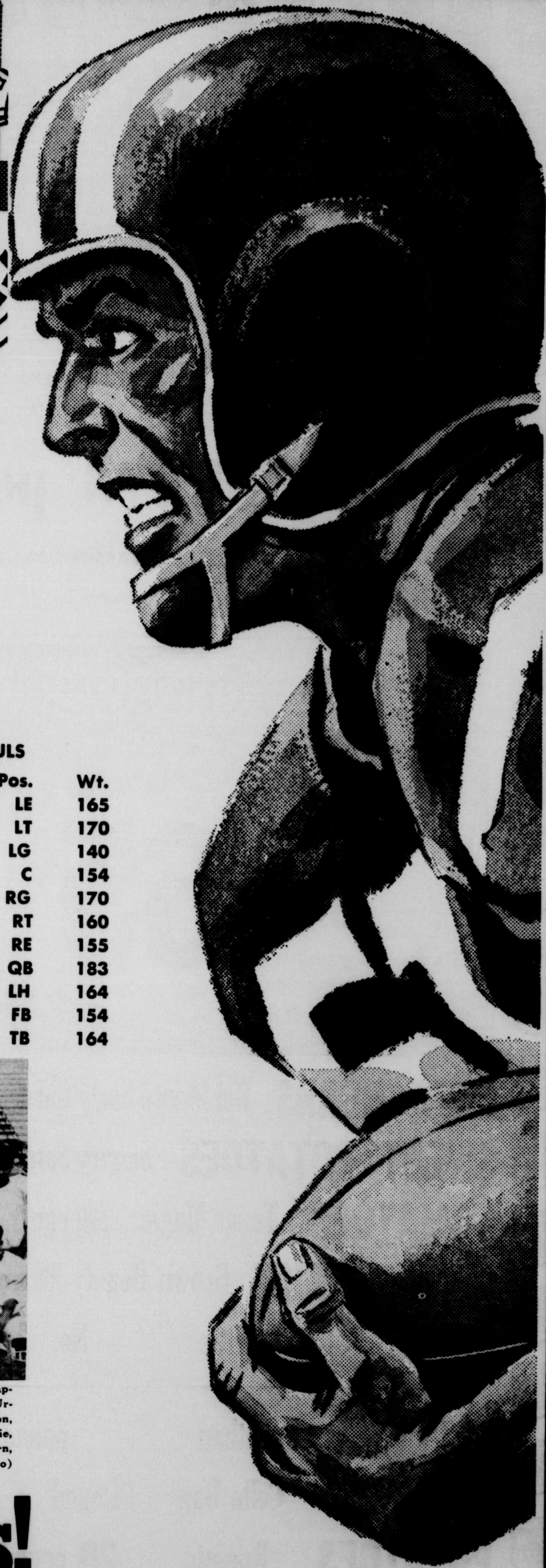

Smith, who has been named by Gov. David Cargo to direct the property reappraisal program in New Mexico, is credited with establishing and maintaining the Cobre District as one of the top units in the New Mexico public school system.

Foard County Landowners Urged to Reply to Report Service Questionnaire

Information supplied by some 35,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will become the basis for the official crop production estimates for each county and the state.

County Agent Joe Burkett said a representative number of farmers and ranchers in Foard County will be among the 35,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire from state statistician Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. The questionnaires will be mailed during the last half of October.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers in planning their production and marketing, farm program participation and also for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, emphasized Burkett.

Because of the importance of the program, the county agent urges every producer in the county who receives a questionnaire from the Crop and Livestock Reporting Service to fill it out completely for his farm or ranch and return it to the Austin office of the reporting service.

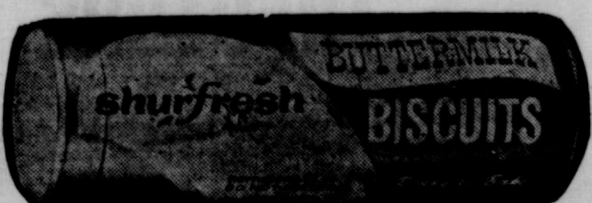
