Foard Farmers Names Appear in Federal Book

For a book prepared in connection with the U. S. Senate hearings during the 90th Congress on appropriations to the U. S. Department of Agriculture and related agencies, all farmers' names are listed who received as much as \$5,000 under the farm and conservation programs for the 1967 calendar year ending June 30, and also the total amount paid to the group.

Forty-five Foard County farmers made the list and these 45 were paid a total of \$348,279.00.

Information on amounts paid to producers was used by several congressmen, especially from urban districts, who sought to place a ceiling on the amount of money any one producer might receive under the government farm program.

The new rate calls for a minimum of 7,000 gallons for \$9.00. Water used in excess of the 7,000-gallon minimum will be sold for 85¢ per 1,000 gallons.

The Crowell Wildcats face another tough District 11-A foe here Friday night when they are hosts to the Chillicothe Eagles in a game scheduled to begin at 8 p. m.

The Eagles have a 1 win, 2 losses in district play and are 1-2 in season action. They dropped a district game to Archer last Friday night 22-14, a game in which they led 14-6 at halftime.

Always tough, and especially against traditional rival Crowell, the Eagles have 13 seniors on their squad and 9 of these seniors are starters. Crowell barely edged the Eagles last year in a non-conference battle which ended the season for both teams.

Law Given on Voting by New County Residents

Voters in the coming general election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the office of the County Clerk, Cornelia McDaniel, by Nov. 1, Mrs. McDaniel said this week.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide offices, including president and vice president, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues. However, instead of voting at a regular polling place on election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence. This period, which is the same as the period for absentee voting, began on October 16 and will end on November 1.

If the voter has lived in the same congressional, legislative, or judicial district for six months, he may also vote on that district office.

In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county clerk's office. However, if he has lost his certificate, he may vote after making an affidavit of its loss.

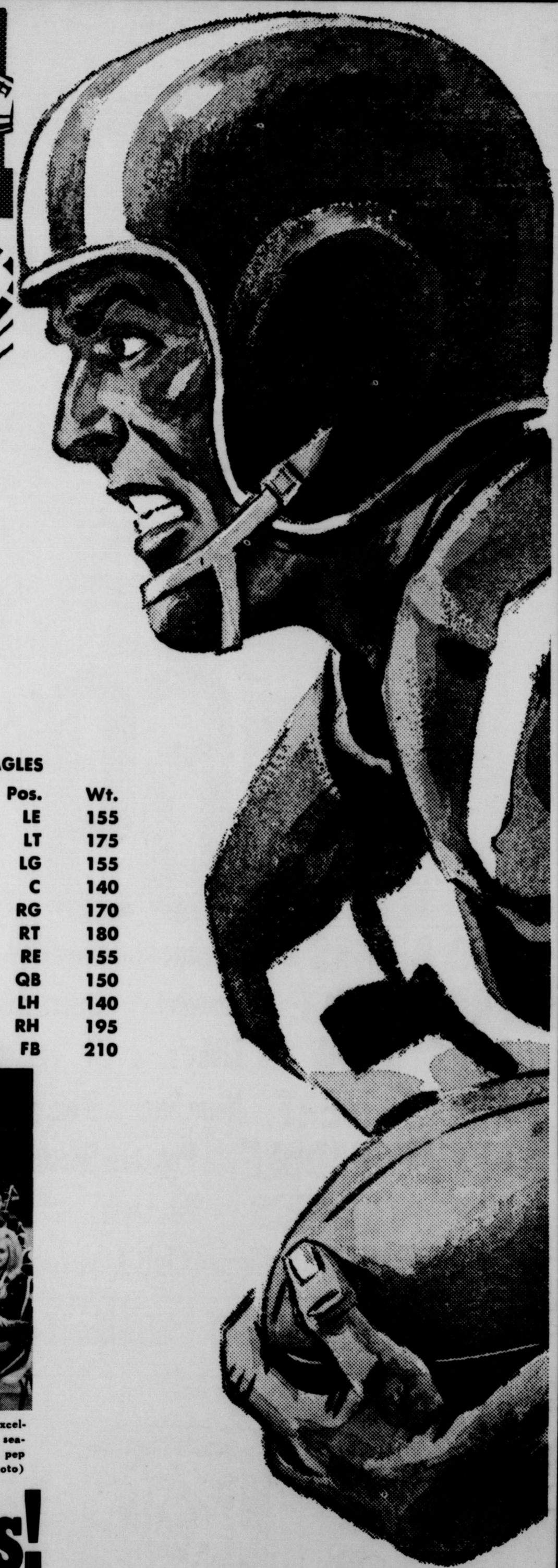

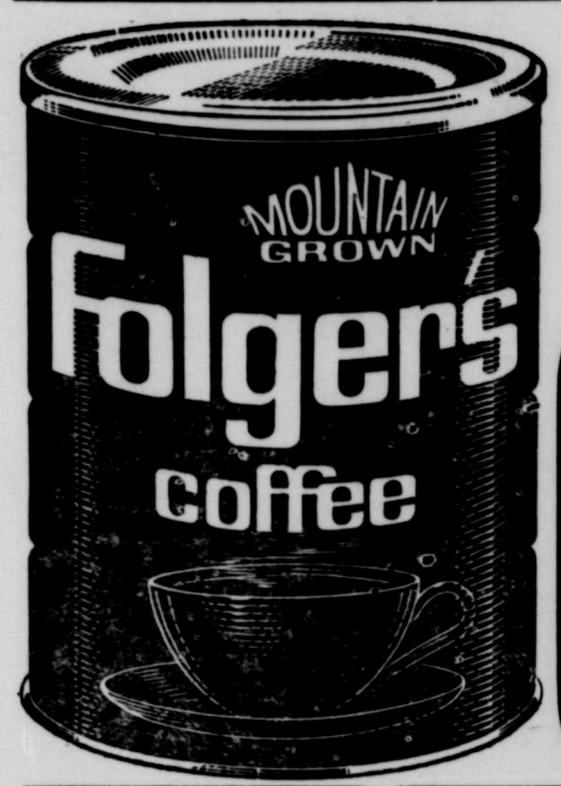

Purcell Praised by Wichita Falls Writer

In a recent column, "Doin' It Up Brown," by Farm Editor Joe Brown of the Wichita Falls Record-News, Mr. Brown pointed out some of the things Congressman Graham Purcell has done to aid farmers. Some of the highlights of the story follow:
 Purcell has worked closely with the National Association of Wheat Growers in developing wheat programs. What legislation he has helped pass has been with the cooperation of the wheat farmers and if anyone should represent the feelings of the growers of our bread grain, it should be the N. A. W. G. They have no insurance programs, no political axes to grind. In fact, the wheat growers claim their organization is interested in only one thing: getting a fair price for the grain they grow. Purcell was the leader in getting his wheat legislation through Congress and believe me that is getting more difficult every day. More and more urban congressmen are being sent to Congress.
 Maybe you believe in getting the government out of the pricing picture to let wheat find its own level on the free market. The majority of urban congressmen would agree, since it would save federal tax money for urban projects. But then how would you feel about dropping the federal cost-sharing of the Agricultural Conservation Program of the ASCS and Great Plains conservation work on your range and cultivated lands? Would an urban congressman even know the difference?
 From an agriculture point of view, Purcell is a ranking member of the House Agriculture Committee and chairman of its subcommittee on grains and livestock, North Texas' two most important

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cash crops.
 From the urban point of view, Purcell is a lawyer and former district judge. I can't think of anyone more qualified to understand the problems of the courts, the law enforcement agencies and the everyday folks affected by such courts and policemen. Just this past week it was announced in Washington that Purcell has received another committee assignment: to the committee on Post Office and Civil Service.
