Crowell Wins One, Loses Two in Cage Tilts with Lockett

Crowell Tournament Scheduled for December 12, 13

There were three basketball games played in Crowell on Tuesday, Nov. 26 between Crowell and Lockett. The B boys, composed of freshmen and sophomores, were defeated by the Lockett B team by the score of 33-12. The high scorer for Crowell was Bill Erwin with six points. High pointer for Lockett was Terry Cato with 12 points.

The A team girls were also defeated by Lockett. Rheta Howard was high point girl for Crowell with 5. High point scorer for the Lockett girls was Susan Daniel with 13 points. All of the fourteen Crowell girls who were suited up saw action for Crowell.

The A team boys defeated the Lockett boys by the score of 57 to 47. It was an extremely close battle throughout the game with the score being tied 23-23 at halftime. High point man for Crowell was Billy Hord with 24 points.

Other top scorers for the Cats were Gary Cates with 10; Charles Dodd, Larry Swan and Kenneth Sellers, all with seven points each.

High pointer for Lockett was Tommy Halenack with 17.

Crowell meets Harrold Tuesday, Dec. 3, here, and on Friday, Dec. 6. Lockett again comes to Crowell with A and B boys and A girls games. The B game will start at 5:30 and the girls game at 7, followed by the A boys. On Dec. 10, Crowell travels to Northside for boys and girls games at 7.

Cotton Farmers Balloting on Marketing Quotas

Foard County cotton producers will ballot this week on cotton marketing quotas for the 1969 production year.

About 550 producers—including wives—will be eligible to vote in the election.

Mrs. Jean Reeder, office manager for the ASCS, said that ballots were mailed out to local producers Friday. Ballots postmarked or brought to the ASCS office through Friday, Dec. 6, will be eligible for counting.

Husbands and wives must mail ballots in separate envelopes and properly complete certification on the envelopes if votes are to be counted.

Ballots will be counted Wednesday, Dec. 11.

Notices of farm acreage allotments and projected yields on individual farms have been mailed to producers.

Mrs. Reeder said that at least two-thirds of the growers in the nation voting must approve marketing quotas if they are to become effective for the 1969 crop.

If quotas are not approved, there will be no upland cotton payment program. However, the allotment program will remain in effect and price-support loans will be available at 50 per cent of parity to farmers who keep within their allotments.

If quotas are approved, as cotton farmers have traditionally done by overwhelming margins, the upland cotton program under which payments are made to co-operators will be in effect and growers who exceed their farm acreage allotment will be subject to penalties on the farm's excess production. The penalty will be 50 per cent of the cotton parity price as of June 16, 1969. Marketing quotas are presently in effect.

Funding for EOAC Existing Grants Ended Nov. 30

The program year for all existing grants of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation expired November 30, Don Ross Malone, executive director of the EOAC, said last week end.

"Although November 30 marked the end of this year's grants, we have authorization from the regional office of Economic Opportunity to continue our programs based on our current level of operation. There will be no interruption of EOAC projects as has occurred in the past. The Letter of Agreement which gives us authorization to continue operating and which spells out the approximate level of funding for next program year will reflect approximately a ten per cent cut from our previous year's level of approved program. However, we do feel that we will be able to absorb this cut without noticeable defect to most projects."

"We are anticipating arrival of the actual grant documents that spell out the parts of our next program year's budget. This document will be reviewed in the quarterly board meeting of the Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation Board of Directors to be held December 17 in Crowell. If the grant is not received by this time, a special meeting will have to be called for review of the grant by the board of directors."

Oil Test Staked on G. C. Owens' Land

Tom B. Medders of Wichita Falls staked a 5,600-foot Strawn wildcat as No. 1 G. C. Owens, 780 feet from the north and 2,350 feet from the east lines of J. Garrett survey, four miles northwest of Foard City.

The new test is 6 and one-fourth miles south of the Raspberry Caddo Field.

One snow in Foard County during November is an unusual occurrence, but two snows in November, within the space of three days is almost unheard of.

Yet, that is exactly what happened last week.

The county had received a fine rain Tuesday of last week. The cloudy cold weather held over until Wednesday and the snow began falling Wednesday afternoon and continued on into the night.

A warm sun Thanksgiving day melted the snow which accumulated to a depth of an inch or two and was sufficient for several snow men to be constructed in yards over town before it melted.

Then again on Saturday, heavy moisture-laden clouds began dropping the white stuff which again covered the ground before it stopped later in the afternoon.

Saturday night, the mercury began rising, melting most of the last snow during the night.

The weather was not cold enough to accumulate on the streets and highways to cause dangerous driving.

Moisture Last Week
Merl Kincaid reported the government gauge recorded a total of 2.14 inches of moisture last week from the rain and two snows.

This brought the total for the month of November up to 3.15 inches, which is the most moisture received here during November in over a dozen years.

Another cold front pushing into this area late Monday kicked off a few showers in this area Monday night, and the government gauge showed .3 inch fell here.

Postmaster Offers Ideas for Christmas Mailing of Packages

Postmaster Ted Reeder has some special ideas about how Christmas can be made merrier, based on his years of service in the post office.

Visit the post office this week while the crowds are still small. Buy all the extra stamps you'll need. The time of mailing is especially important—the earlier the better. Always write or print carefully and use ZIP code in both mailing and return addresses.

Use of first class postage on greeting cards will make sure your mail is forwarded if the recipient has moved. Mail will be returned to you if it is poorly addressed or there is no forwarding address.

Wrap packages neatly and well. A card or piece of paper inside the package carrying your name and address and that of the person to whom the parcel is addressed will insure delivery in case wrapping comes loose. A list of the contents will help postal "re-wrap" clerks in the event your package is poorly wrapped and bursts. Place the address and return address on only one side of the parcel. The important thing is to do your shopping and mail early.

300 New Books

Crowell Independent School District has acquired some 300 new library-bound books to supplement regular instructional textbooks under a low-cost lease-purchase arrangement, it was announced today by Henry Black, Supt.
 According to Mr. Black, a firm in California is supplying the hard-cover supplementary books under a program reported to cut costs by as much as 50 per cent of the standard cash purchase price.
 The variety of subjects covered in the book order include social studies, fine arts, science and history. In addition there are atlases and encyclopedias for reference work.

Under the leasing program, the district is receiving the entire book order while acquiring title to one-quarter of the books each year through four annual installments of \$268.65. Black stated that many of the books will be placed in classrooms on a year-round basis for completing class assignments or for home use in individualized student reading programs.

"We want to see more research and reference materials readily available for students to reinforce textbook information," Black said.
 "A good selection of relevant books should foster important regular reading habits and broaden the scope of the youngsters' reading activities," he added. "The goal of our curriculum enrichment program is to make every child an independent and willing user of supplementary book resources."

As an incentive to the take-home program for pleasure reading or study supplementation, the leasing company guarantees replacement of any books that are lost or worn out during the four-year contract.

The district will also receive credit for 25 per cent of the purchase order to be used in selecting additional volumes. An added feature of the agreement protects the district against inflation by allowing for reorder of books at comparable prices at the end of four years.

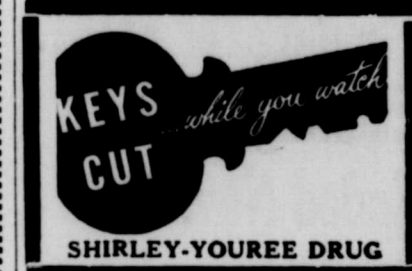



Ample Food Supply on Hand This December

What could mean more during December than a good supply of food?

Turkeys and broilers are available in big volume now, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. You'll also find more than adequate offerings of fresh oranges and grapefruit, dried prunes, canned tomatoes and tomato products, onions and dry beans.

All are on the December plentiful foods list compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Orange production this season is forecast at 41 per cent above average—and grapefruit production is estimated to be 26 per cent more than normal. The Texas early and midseason crop is expected to be the largest in twenty

years. Shipments of both oranges and grapefruit are on the upswing, according to market news offices of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Volume of canned tomatoes and tomato products on hand should exceed market requirements, due to a record-high production of tomatoes for processing. The late-summer onion crop is the second largest on record. And dry bean output is about 14 per cent over last year.

Keep plentiful foods in mind while doing your holiday food shopping.
