
pattern was uncovered by the U. S. Department of Transportation. In an August 1968 report to the Congress, the Secretary of Transportation said, "The use of alcohol by drivers and pedestrians leads to some 25,000 deaths and a total of at least 800,000 crashes in the United States each year."

The Department of Transportation report went on to say that "through research conducted over the past 35 years, 'alcohol has been found to be the largest single factor leading to fatal crashes.' Drivers with very high concentration of alcohol in their blood-'one to four per cent of drivers on the road'-are accounting for about 50-55 per cent of all single vehicle crashes in which drivers are fatally injured."

Studies indicate that a driver with 0.10 per cent by weight blood alcohol is six or seven times as likely to be involved in an accident as a nondrinking driver, and at 0.15 per cent by weight, he is 25 times as likely to be involved. Speir said, "It is hoped that the Department of Public Safety's breathalyzer project will hit hard

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
