

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Farmers who earned at least two-thirds of their 1968 gross income from farming operations should file their declaration of estimated federal income tax, including self-employment, for 1968 with the Southwest Service Center, 3651 Interregional Highway, Austin 78740, on or before Jan. 15 with form 1040-ES being used for this purpose.

However, Ellis Campbell, Jr., district director of Internal Rev. enue for Northern Texas, said that farmers do not have to file an estimate if they file their 1968 federal income tax return and pay all the tax due by Feb. 17, 1969.

I've been taking for him? A. If your son is under 19 at his support, his earnings will not cause you to lose the exemption you claim for him. Your son must file a return if he has gross income of \$600 or more. He should also file a return if his income was less than that but taxes were withheld from his wages. He cannot obtain a refund of these taxes unless he files a return.

Q. Do I have to report tip income to my employer?

A. If you have tip income of \$20 or more a month while working for any one employer then be sure you report it to this employer each month. Otherwise, you may be subject to a penalty of up to 50 per cent of the social security tax on the tips.

Q. I am a farmer and I donated, a young steer I raised to a church bull roast. How do I figure the value of this contribution?

A. Use its fair market value at the time of the donation as the amount of your charitable contribution. However, the costs and expenses of the steer incurred in the year of contribution must be removed from your deductible

Q. Can I spread over several

Then you would only be taxed on that part of the profit you received in 1968. This installment method can only be used when you receive payments of not more than 30 per cent of the selling price in the year of sale. If you receive more than 30 per cent, the entire gain must be reported in the year of sale.

Q. My brother and I help support our mother. Who gets to claim her as a dependent this

A. Under the support test for claiming a dependent, the person who provides more than half the total support for the calendar year is entitled to claim the exemption. To determine whether you or your brother qualify, add up your mothers' food, clothing, shelter and other items of support for the year. Then find out whether you or your brother supplied more than half of them. If neither you nor your brother furnished more than half of this support but your combined contributions totaled over half the support, then you may want to consider the multiple support agreement. Such an agreement enables one of you to claim your mother as a dependent providing certain conditions are met. Be sure to check this provision of the law, as well as the other dependency tests, before you file your return.

Way back, "Since Buck was a yearling," Internal Revenue has been telling taxpayers to SIGN those tax returns-both husband and wife if a joint return. In pointing out the more common errors made by taxpayers throughout the country, IRS says forgetting to sign was still a major problem last year. However, in the Dallas district, very few taxpayers forgot to sign their re-turns. It appears that the Texas tax folks talk to Texas taxpayers a lot more about signing those returns. We know Texans are often accused of talking more or too much. We're not sure whether Texans-even those working for IRS-talk more than the average American, but Texas taxpayers following IRS's advice does disprove the old saying-"You can tell a Texan, but not very much." 
