Economist George Hagedorn noted that, "The 10 per cent surcharge on corporate and individual income taxes, imposed on us by a law passed last June, is scheduled to terminate June 30. 1969. The next Congress will, of course, be free to pass additional legislation extending its life beyond that point.
