





The proposed amendment also provides that enumerated sections be repealed with the specific understanding that the repeal shall not in any way make any substantive changes in the present constitution.

There are several recognized grounds upon which a specific constitutional provision may be determined to be obsolete. While space does not warrant discussion of each such provision repealed by the proposed amendment, several examples of the specific types of obsolete provisions will be illustrative:

1. Obsolescence due to exhaustion of subject matter. The subject matter may no longer exist. Such appears, for example, to be the case of Section 6 of Article XIV, providing for homestead donations out of the otherwise unallocated public domain. This provision became obsolete some time prior to 1898 upon exhaustion of and distribution. lands subject to such donation.
