



1200 Sailors to Leave Vietnam

Washington-About 1200 sailors will be sent home from Vietnam by August as part of the planned 25,000-man U. S. troop withdrawal. Navy men on duty in South Vietnam now total about 36,000 not counting the 35,000 serving aboard 7th Fleet ships off the Vietnam coast.

Those designated for reassignment will come from the Mobile Riverine Force in the Mekong Delta and units supporting Marines in the North. Among the Marines, the regimental landing team 9 of the 3rd Marine Division has been designated to come home. Also scheduled for redeployment are the barracks ships Mer-

cer and Nueces, the tank landing ship Whitfield County and the USS APL-26.
