



In vetoing the money for a state parkland purchase in Heatly's district, Smith said it was not requested by the Parks and Wildlife Department and did not appear in either the House or Senate version of the bill.

He recalled that voters approved a \$75 million bond issue for state parks development and a plan for the development of the park system has been worked out by state agencies. He said "Acquisition and development of parks such as this one in the appropriation should be accomplished under the park bond development program applied by the department.'

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
