

Eligible cotton producers will vote on whether to accept the new marketing quota in a referendum to be held by mail on December through 5, the Foard County A. S. C. S. office, announced this

For the 1970 crop, the farm domestic acreage allotment has been set at 65 per cent of the acreage allotment, the minimum authorized by law. Farmers who sign up to participate in the program and who plant at least their domestic allotment, but not in excess of the permitted acreage for the farm, will be eligible for price support loans and price su port payments based on the farm's domestic allotment. Other details of the 1970 cot-



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

#### **Livestock Reports Needed from Farmers** and Ranchers

During the last half of November, some 40,000 Texas ranchers and farmers will receive a livestock survey questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, USDA, to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

In Texas, there are 254 counties, and each farmer and rancher in each county is an important part of the state's agriculture. Their reports are needed to provide accurate estimates for Texas cattle, hogs and chickens. Another survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

John McAlister, head of the lo cal Soil Conservation Service office urges each farmer and/or rancher to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the agricultural statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the state.
