The 1970 loan rate will be \$1.30 per bushel. The 1969 loan rate was \$1.26 per bushel.

A one-cent-per-bushel discount for number two wheat, three cent discount for number three and four cent discount for number four wheat was announced.

Light smutty wheat also will be discounted two cents per bush-Number three or better wheat

will draw a premium of two cents per bushel. Again in 1970, protein premiums will be paid. Protein content from 12.0 to 12.4 will be 2, Crowell.

Time to Turn Back the Clock?

It's getting to be more of a compliment all the time to be told that we are trying to "turn back the clock" when we stand up for a solid, time-honored principle. Some back-tracking would be
