Texas Corn Crop Not Affected

Dry weather rather than the Southern Corn Leaf Blight has cut corn yields over much of Texas. Dr. Wendell Horne, extension plant pathologist, said the fungus disease which is playing havoc with corn crops in some states reached Texas a bit too late. Greatest yield losses apparently occur when severe infestation hit the corn plants at the silking and tassel stage. Texas corn was past this stage when the infestations started. Horne does not see the disease as an annual threat to Texas corn production.
