The two Crowell school buses whichsince the beginning of school on August 17-had been going short distances into the west edge of the Vernon school district to pick up about 46 pupils who had legally transferred to Crowell, made their last runs out of the local district Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon, the buses delivered the children to the district line where volunteers from Foard County picked up the children and took them to their destinations because Crowell Supt. Larry Jones was notified by mail Monday by Leon R. Graham of Austin, assistant commissioner of the Texas Education Agency, to halt the buses from crossing the Crowell-Vernon boundary to pick up the children.

All this comes about as a result of a protest filed by Vernon authorities with the Texas Education Agency relative to Crowell picking up these legally-transferred students. Local school authorities had tentative permission from the state to pick up the students if Vernon did not protest. **But Vernon did protest!**

For years, the Lockett School District was allowed to send its bus into the old Riverside and Thalia School Districts to pick up scholastics who had transferred to the Lockett School District. At that time application for duplicate service had to be made and the Foard County School Board always made application to the Texas Education Agency to allow this to

Since Crowell is not being re-imbursed for the mileage traveled in the Vernon district, local officials do not consider the routes to be duplications of Vernon routes since the state is paying Vernon the mileage instead of both Crowell and Vernon.

On last May 28, Crowell Supt. Jones wrote the Wilbarger County School Board requesting duplicate bus service, and the only word Mr. Jones ever had on the subject was a carbon copy of a letter from the Texas Education Agency to the Wilbarger County Board stating that the forms were no longer available.

Since the State Legislature has passed a law permitting students to transfer to any school they wish to attend, the question has been asked here, "Is this refusal to let buses pick up the children a violation of their civil rights?"

Frank Cooper, president of the Crowell Booster Club, is seeking volunteers to help get the children to and from the Crowell bus routes on the district boundary.


