





"Midge" Attacks Foard County's **Guar Fields**

The midge which is attacking war in Foard County has been identied as Cecidomyia Texana, according to County Agent Joe Burkett. The life cycle of this insect is composed of egg, larva, pupa and adult stages. The larva stage feeds in the buds of guar throughout the blooming period causing the buds to fall from the plant resulting in decreased yields. The larva is white to pink in

color early in its development, becoming orange in color as it develops. A full grown larva is about one-sixteenth of an inch long. The pupa stage of this insect has not been observed, but is probably completed in the soil. Adults are less than a sixteenth of an inch long and are gray to light brown checked and carried out in color. The length of time spent in each of these stages is unknown. The guar midge has many generations each year.

Burkett says at this time there are no pesticides approved by the Food and Drug Administration for the control of the guar midge.
