1970 Is Not SCHOOL TO DISMISS TUESDAY **Driest Year on** FOR 12-DAY

Does 1970 seem like the driest year you can ever remember?

Record Here

It may seem like it is the driest, but at least two years have been drier in Foard County.

It was only 14 years ago that it was considerably drier than 1970 has been, for in 1956, Foard County received only 10.28 inches of moisture.

Much farther back -1917—this county received only 11.27 inches of moisture, which is also less than the 13.63 inches recorded this year.

These two years-1917 and 1956-are the only years on record that were drier than 1970. Rainfall records for this county go back to 1913.

Normal rainfall for the county is about 24 inches a year.



If you graduate in the top ter per cent of your high school class, you will be admitted immediately, regardless of your SAT score.

If you graduate in the top quar ter-but not the top 10 per centof your high school class, you will be admitted immediately if your

SAT score is at least 800. If you graduate in the second third or fourth quarter of your high school class and meet current admission requirements at those of others in your category. Those whose names are drawn which you enter.





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
