

Bell. Mr. Johnson was appointed last year to fill the unexpired term of the late Merl Kincaid. His appointment was effective until this election on Saturday.

In the county trustee election, Otis Gafford is unopposed in his bid for re-election as trustee-atlarge and Herbert Fish is unopposed as a candidate for election as trustee for Precinct No. 4.

City Election

In the City election, Robert Kincaid is unopposed on the ballot as a candidate for re-election as mayor and Leonard Tole, Charles Branch and Glyndon Johnson are unopposed candidates for aldermen. Tole and Branch are seeking re-election while this is Mr. Johnson's first bid for a seat on the City Council. Recie Womack did not file for re-election as alderman.

The City election will be held in the city hall with Mrs. L. A. Andrews as presiding officer. She will be assisted by two clerks.



Full grown larvae are about onefourth inch long and these larvae are now present in alfalfa fields in Foard County, Burkett said. Alfalfa fields damaged by the weevil appear greenish-gray at first; as damaged leaves dry, the field takes on a grayish to whitish cast. Alfalfa weevil larvae have been known to completely destroy the first crop of alfalfa. The second crop may be reduced by the larvae feeding on the developing shoots.

Once a field of alfalfa becomes infested with the alfalfa weevils, damage usually occurs year after year. For control, farmers should follow approved cultural practices in order that a dense, vigorous stand will be maintained. The first crop should be cut when most of the plants are in the bud stage and cut as clean and close as pos sible to deprive the larvae of food and shelter. Exposure of the larvae to the sun is usually fatal.
