Due to the extended drouth which has held this area in its grip for so long, the ASCS reports that the county landowners have abandoned a total of 53,274 acres seeded to wheat leaving only 18,071 acres for harvest. However, Mrs. Jean Reeder, executive director of the Foard ASC office, said Tuesday that her office estimates that only about 10,000 of these acres will be harvested in the county.

Crowellites Builds Largest Organ **Biggest Electronic** Organ Placed in Chicago Auditorium

Thomas Cotner, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Cotner of Martha, Okla., has put together the world's largest electronic organ for the Chicago Auditorium Theater.

Twice the size of the next largest electronic organ, the four-manual Saville has 172 ranks to make age before July 1, will sign up 172 different sounds. An average theater organ has 15 to 20 ranks; and the Radio City organ has 58, according to the Chicago Tribune.

Mr. Cotner's mother is the former Miss Bess Thompson of Crowell. He is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Thompson and nephew of the late Mrs. A. Y. Norman, all of Crowell.

Mr. Cotner has appeared in Crowell on two different occasions, in piano and organ recitals, and appeared regularly over television from Wichita Falls while attending Midwestern University.

Cotner has spent the past two rears in Chicago with the Saville Organ Co., creating the 1,500pound console which has nine divisions, pistons served by a computer-type memory, 246,000 feet of wiring circuits and 217,560 individually hand-soldered components "give or take 20 or 30 thousand" in Cotner's words.

It will use 4,000 watts of audio power, and 216 amplifiers, each with its own speaker system. The \$130,000 organ is to sit in the orchestra pit to broadcast its

The High Plains contributes to the record with an annual vegetable production of \$23 millionprincipally in potatoes, onions, carrots, cucumbers, lettuce, green beans, tomatoes, watermelons and cantaloupes.

The prospects for greater vegetable production is "indeed bright," according to Dr. Sam E. Curl, associate dean of Texas Tech's College of Agricultural Scinces whose specific interest is the college's research programs.

Newspaper Costs Soar With New Postage Rate

Newspapers to Get 142% Rise In Postal Rates

Newspaper and magazine publishers lost their battle with the postal service last week when, according to a story in The Dallas Morning News, the Supreme Court refused to block postal rate increases which went into effect

Sunday, May 16. After losing in courts, publishers turned to the high court Saturday, May 15, arguing that the rates were set illegally and would cost newspapers and magazines a total of

\$850,000 a week. But Chief Justice Warren E. Burger denied the appeal for emergency relief, giving no reason. This opened the way for the rates to become effective a

minute after midnight last Sun-Second class postage, which newspapers come under, is marked for a 142 per cent increase in the postal service's permanent rate package. The increase would be implemented over a 5-year period, making the first year's increase about 28 per cent. Third class rates, however (which includes all box holder mailings in quantity) will increase by only about 33 and one-third per cent.

President Nixon has asked Conman of the Wilbarger Soil and gress to add \$65 million to the Water Conservation District; fund from which FHA finances its nationwide emergency farm loan program, Mr. Futch said.

The Farmers Home Administration has already made 1,503 emergency loans totaling \$15 million to farmers and ranchers in Texas to help them overcome the disastrous effects of the drought which has scorched parts of the state since the spring of 1970.

Emergency loans are made to enable farmers and ranchers to continue normal operations which have been disrupted by natural disasters. These loans previously were available in 53 Texas counties, and last month the Secretary of Agriculture increased the number to 235 counties.

The impact of the drought has centered primarily in Texas and Oklahoma, but Mr. Futch said that emergency loans may be suffered severe losses as a result of the drought.

Current interest rates on emergency loans are 4 and 7/8 per cent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers, Mr. Futch
