

Unformtunately the drouth has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drouth. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided your sales for the year are in excess of normal sales) if you reinvest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Service in exceptional cases, Publication 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drouth sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40. Local county agents have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drouth sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in advance.

Information about social security is available in pamphlet form. These pamphlets may be obtained from any social security office. If there is no social security office in your town, there are pamphlet racks in most post offices and ourthouses



The chamber federation president, who is also chairman of the board of Wachovia Bank and Trust Co., N. A., Winston-Salem, N. C. points out that, despite the \$2,400 guaranteed income for a family of four as contained in H. R. 1, advocates of this scheme feel the guarantee should be raised to meet the "minimum standard of need," and are trying to increase

the annual guarantee to \$6,500. Even the \$2,400 guarantee figure would nearly double the tremendous and costly welfare rolls, according to the House Ways and Means Committee estimate, and the \$6,500 guarantee would cover half the American population, the national chamber president de-

The nation's welfare problems are in desperate need for reform, the national chamber contends, but guaranteeing a minimum inme that promises to cost bilons of the taxpayers' dollars is not the way to achieve change. The chamber federation feels

that, instead, those on the nation's welfare rolls who are truly unemployable should continue to receive assistance. Those who are capable of working ought to be offered job training, job placement, help in getting to and from obs, and whatever else is needed to get them off welfare rolls and nto payrolls.

The decision whether or not to double-at the minimum-the present welfare rolls will soon come before the Senate. The national chamber encourages every citizen to consider how he feels about the issue, and to make his views known.
