



A total of 290,706 deer was legally taken during the 1970 season. That's a lot of deer, but the total represents only about nine per cent of the herd.

Biologists say under most conditions an annual harvest of 15 per cent to 25 per cent of the herd is appropriate. In fact, studies have shown that a higher harvest rate results in a healthier leer herd from year to year.

The state's overall deer population is remaining fairly stable at around 3.2 million animals, but civilization's constant inroads on deer habitat are likely to reduce that number in the next few years.




