time last year.

The Consumer and Marketing Service reported marketing activity increased, and demand continued good on all qualities. Prices ranged from 30 to 32.80 cents per pound, with the average 32.35 cents, one hundred points higher seed prices fluctuated between \$50 and \$58 per ton, mostly about \$56 per ton.

Continued fair weather has added to the momentum of the cotton harvest as cotton stripping is in full swing.





Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Foard County are presently about \$2,-484,000, says Burkett. The most important ones are small grain, livestock and cotton. They are expected to account for about 85 per cent of the projected 1976 totals. The reduced income in 1971 was due to extended drouth, Burkett added.
