

Miss Darry Worley has been named Crowell High School's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for 1972. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by senior girls on Dec. 7, and has received a specially designed award charm from the sponsor of the contest. Additionally, she is now eligible for state and national honors.

The state homemaker of tomorrow, to be selected from all school winners in the state in judging which will center on performance in the Dec. 7 test, will be awarded a \$1,500 college scholarship. Her school will receive a complete set of encyclopedia. A scholarship of \$500 will go to the secondranking girl in the state.

This April, the 51 winners rep resenting all states and the District of Columbia-each accompanied by a faculty adviser-will be given an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. Personal observation and interviews during the tour, added to the earlier state-level judging results, will culminate in the announcement of the national winner. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000, with those of three runners-up raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.





Original site of the structure donated to the ranch headquarters by Mr. and Mrs. Bascomb Cox of Ozona, is near the Pecos River and west of that southwest Texas city.



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
