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

## Feel the Pinch?

One of the major reasons you are feeling a pinch in your budget is the increasing cost of government. According to the latest estimates, over one dollar of every three generated in income is returned to the government in the form of taxes. Thirty years ago it was only one dollar of every

Taxes have been growing at a brisk rate, partly due to inflation and partly due to the increased services demanded by taxpayers. State and local taxes illustrate this growth. Between 1957 and 1969, these taxes per person more than doubled in all but ten of the

A major cause of the increasing tax burden is the boom in welfare costs. Spending by state and local governments for welfare purposes rose 247 per cent in the period 1957-69, a rate of increase greater than for any other major, state-local government function, including education.

While the average man on the street may not be aware of this, you can be sure he has more than a sneaking suspicion that the growing welfare program is behind it all. The time is ripe for a serious reappraisal of the entire welfare program. Few taxpayers would deny help to those in genuine need. The argument is with those who see welfare as a way of life and no intention for change or improvement.



## **Grants Approved** for Nortex Group

Two grants totaling \$34,807 for Nortex Regional Planning Commis sion and Wichita county were among awards recommended last week by the Criminal Justice Council executive committee. The funding is subject to final approv

al of Governor Preston Smith. The Criminal Justice Council oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

Nortex RPC's application was approved for \$14,307 to provide a regional law enforcement training program for the 12 counties it serves. This is the third year that CJC has funded this project.

Nortex RPC will provide basic and advanced training for law enforcement officers of the region and will send officers to the Southern Police Institute, the National Armed Robbery Conference and a federal narcotics school in Wash ington, D. C.

Local governments in the region will contribute a \$11,610 in-kind match. Counties in the region are Childress, Cottle, Hardeman, Foard, Wilbarger, Baylor, Wichita, Archer, Young, Clay, Jack and Montague.

Also approved for Nortex was \$20,500 grant application for hiring a radio engineer to supervise planning and implementation of a regional law enforcement radio communications system.

The engineer would inventory existing radio equipment, prepare a detailed system design and specifications, assist in reviewing oids and supervise implementation of the regional radio system. The regional system is design-

ed as a part of a statewide law enforcement radio communication network. Nortex PRC will provide an in-kind match of \$7,075.
