

EVENING SCHOOL

Evening school classes will also be offered in standard academic courses and in adult non-credit courses of all subject categories in which sufficient students and qualified instructors can be secured. Twelve students will be the minimum class size for evening school and costs per course will start at about \$10 per student, depending on the course offered. The evening school will be open from 7 p. m. to 10 p. m. daily Monday through Friday.

### What It Will Cost to Attend

Tuition costs at Vernon Regional Junior College will be \$60 per semester for a normal full-time course load of 15 semester hours for students residing within the Wilbarger Junior College District, the taxing jurisdiction which is providing campus facilities and certain operational costs for the college. Tuition for a similar course load for Texas students residing outside the district will be \$70. The cost will be \$4 per semester hour for each additional course-hour taken. Many students take as many as 17 hours per semester and

may transfer a total of 66 hours to a senior college

or university, sufficient for full Junior status.

Additional expenses which students should be prepared to pay include costs of books, activity fee and laboratory fees, where required for specialized courses. Costs of room and board in private facilities should also be figured if the student does not plan to live at home and commute to the campus during the five days each week—Monday through Friday—in which classes will be offered at the college.

## Assistance for 300 Students

Initial approval has been given for Federal grants that will enable Vernon Regional Junior College to extend financial assistance totalling approximately \$225,000 to some 300 students during its first year of operation.

The funds approved include:

—\$79,750 in Educational Opportunity Grant funds, providing as an outright grant a maximum of \$550 per qualifying student that must be matched by the student personally, or by funds that can be borrowed through the Texas Opportunity Plan for later repayment. The grant would provide funds for at least 145 students.

-\$116,814 in Work-Study Program funds, in which a fulltime student taking 12 semester hours or more can earn up to \$24 a week by working 15 hours at the minimum wage as library assistants, typists, clerks, groundskeepers and lab assistants.

—\$26,548 in National Defense Student Loan Program funds, which the college matches with additional funds, for as many as 29 students, half of which will be written off if the student goes into teaching for as many as five years and the remainder of which must be repaid at 3 per cent interest.

Other forms of assistance, including scholarships to valedictorians of high school graduating classes, are also available. Prospective students interested in any form of assistance are invited to secure additional information from the administration's temporary offices on the third floor of the Herring National Bank building or at the college campus prior to the opening of classes.

Veterans planning to attend under the GI Bill are requested to contact their County Veterans Service Officer or the Wilbarger County Veterans Service Officer, Second Floor, Courthouse, Vernon, Texas, 76384.

- 3. Submit scores on the (ACT) or the (SAT) entrance examination. Any high school graduate who is otherwise qualified will be accepted at Vernon Regional Junior College, as results of the tests are used only for counseling purposes and in proper placement of students in course work.




