In either case, the difference could be the number of fingers remaining on our hand.

On gasoline-powered mowers, ill the gasoline tank before startng the engine-and always do this outside. Handling gasoline inloors may result in a large enough build-up of fumes to cause an exlosion. If refueling is necessary, et the engine cool first. Even a drop of gasoline spilled on the muffler or any other hot part of the engine could start a fire nd cause an explosion.

The social security administration is required by law to review the earnings of a beneficiary each year to determine if the additional earnings will increase his benefit.
