By the end of the month, the total will be about \$685,534.68 to 260 farmers.



Farmers Urged to Study New Safety and Health Act

If farmers in Foard County are not already familiar with the new safety standards required by the Mary W. Phillips of Vernon and al Safety and Health Act (OSHA) new Williams-Steiger Occupation-Mr. Phillips, a veteran of World of 1970, they should become acpossible, says county agent Joe Burkett.

The OSHA has special implications to the farmer who employs anyone at any time outside of his own family, points out the agent. In this case the farmer must display a 10x16-inch safety poster from the U. S. Department of Labor and must comply with four standards that apply to agricul-




