The Texas Easter Seal Society can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved and who are not eligible for help from any other resource-public or private. 1. Assistance in paying for

physical, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor.

2. Pay for special diagnostic evaluation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language and psychological).

3. Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when prescribed by a medical doctor. (There is a \$200 limit placed on artificial limbs. This \$200 is to be used as "seed money" and hopefully will be matched by local reources such as individuals, service clubs, sororities, foundations
