

Some corn is made, though the crop is short and some fields failed entirely. Prospects for a good crop are very dark at the present. The best grade of alfalfa ever grown in this part before is attributed to doing all or most all baling at night with a "pickup" baler.

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

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

In 1972 it was 19.7 million acres and the national average yield was 29.8 bushels per acre which also resulted in 535 million bushels on which certificates were issued to producers.
