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

If you are between 16 and 20 years old, your chances of drowning are higher than they would be in any other age group, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Depart-

The department's water safety education section studied the water-oriented deaths between Sept. 1, 1970, and Aug. 31, 1971, and determined that the 16-20 years- \$5 and \$5.50 for box seats (in- was shipped to Dallas by of-age category was the most dan-

The next-most-dangerous age group was 0-5 years of age. Generally, the older a person gets, the less prone he is, either from experience or susceptability, to drowning.

Not surprisingly, the spring and summer months produced the most drownings. However, more persons drowned in September than in August.

The water safety education section reported 350 drownings during the first six months of 1972.





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
