The Crowell Wildcats will be trying to knock the Archer City Wildcats from District 7-A's undefeated list when the two teams meet at Dick Todd field Friday night in an important district contest for both teams. It is homecoming for Crowell, and the Cats will be "trying to beat the team that beat the team" for it was Archer City that defeated Holliday week before last.

The Archer City Wildcats have won both their District 7-A games "by the skin of their teeth." They won 14-13 over Holliday and last Friday night, took a 1-point win—21-20—over the powerful Paducah Dragons. The Crowell Wildcats are 1-1 in district with a win over Munday and last week's loss to Holliday.

Mr. Quintero had farmed in the Hilland community until moving to Crowell about 15 years ago. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

Survivors include his wife, Josephine; two sons, Ray and Jimmy Quintero, of Crowell; two daughters, Mrs. Henry Aranda and Miss Irma Quintero, also of Crowell; eight grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. Manuela Gomez of Sweetwater.

## COLD NORTHER BLOWS THROUGH MONDAY

Foard County, after receiving 3.27 inches of rain last week, continued to get even wetter this week as a blast of frigid Arctic air sent the mercury plunging, and kicked off rain.

The rain began falling early Monday morning, continued intermittently through Monday and Tuesday night, and by 7:30 a. m., Tuesday, the government gauge had an official 1.49 inches, with the moisture continuing through the day.

The mercury skidded from the mid 60's about noon Monday to the upper 30's early Tuesday.

### Social Security Representative Sets Visit to Crowell

Richard Lawhorn, representative of the Vernon social security office, will be at the community center in Crowell at 9:30 a. m. on Wednesday, November 8. He will take applications for social security.

The 1972 general election to name a president of the United States will be held next Tuesday, November 7, with a blanket-size ballot ready for voters.

Absentee voting will continue through tomorrow afternoon, Friday, November 3, at 5 p. m. in the county and district clerk's office in the court house. Anyone planning to be out of town next Tuesday should vote absentee.

There are three sets of presidential and vice presidential candidates listed on the ballot: Nixon-Agnew (R), McGovern-Shriver (D), and Linda Jenness-Andrew Pulley on the Socialist Workers Party ticket.

The Raza Unida party is listing a number of state candidates.

Of particular interest to Foard County residents is the race for Congressman, 13th District, between Graham Purcell (D), and Bob Price (R). Both men are presently serving in Congress, but the Texas Legislature put the two men in the same district when the state was re-districted earlier this year.

Also on tap for Texas voters are fourteen proposed changes to the Constitution of the state.

There are 1,269 Foard County residents eligible to vote in the general election, and a number of these will be 18 years old. This is the first year that 18-year-old persons have been eligible to vote in general elections.

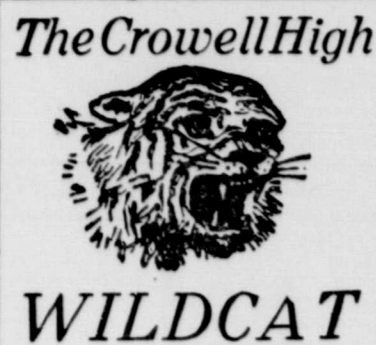

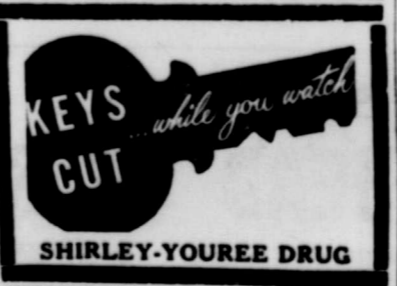

They also visited the Highland at Marlin. This is a restored mansion built in 1900 by Basil Clark.

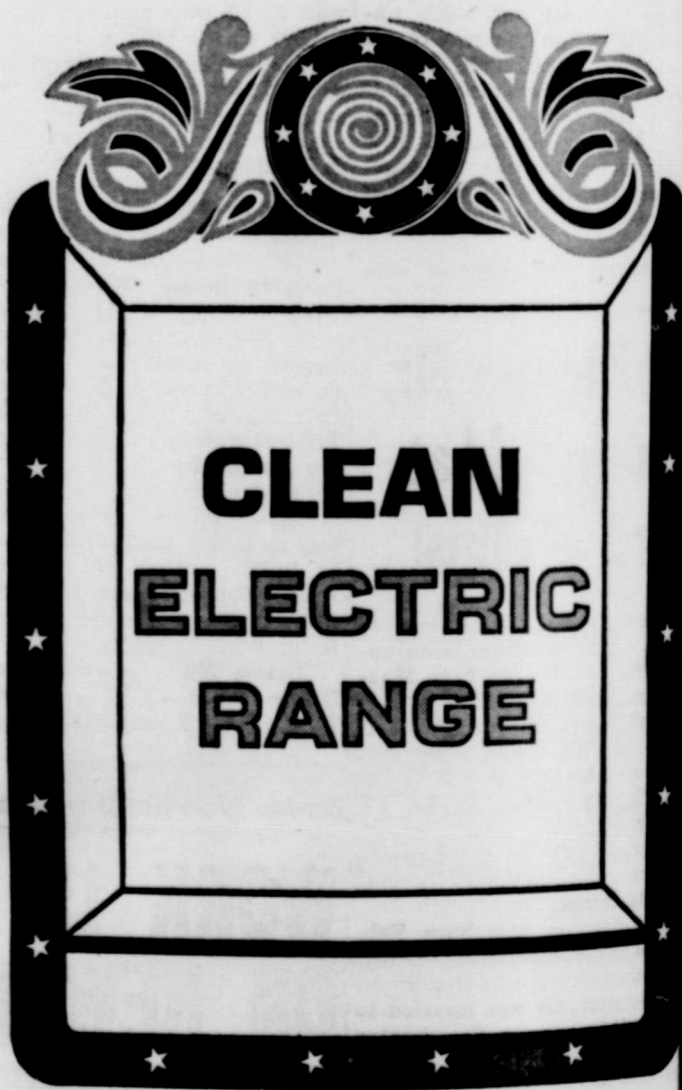

# HOLLIDAY TAKES 7-A WIN OVER CROWELL

The Crowell Wildcats, cast as a state class A powerhouse in pre- and early-season polls, are now 1-1 in District 7-A play as a result of a 24-13 loss to Holliday last Friday night at Eagle field.

Crowell's first touchdown was quick. With Philip Bell as quarterback the drive consisted of a grinding ball-control effort which went for 80 yards. In the drive, Rex Driver ran for 22 yards, Emmitt Newman for 31, and right in the middle of the drive, Newman threw the halfback pass to Johnny Urquiza for 26 yards. Newman then carried the ball over from the 2.

Rocky Bachman kicked the point-after. Early in the second quarter, the Eagles got on the board with a 6-yard touchdown carry by Wes Rathman. The attempted kick for extra point failed.

About midway in the second period, the Eagles went ahead when quarterback Loren Gilmore passed 25 yards to Mack Potter for six points. Again the try for extra point failed. The second Holliday score was set up by a Wildcat fumble on the 29.

Driver ran the ensuing kickoff out to the Wildcat 41, and he then scampered to the Holliday 48 where another 15 yards was added as the result of a Holliday boy hitting late. Another 15-yarder against Holliday set the Wildcats up first and ten on the Holliday 15. Driver and Newman drove to the 5 for a first-and-goal, and Driver scored from one yard out with only 36 seconds left in the half. Trying for 2 points, the Wildcats were stopped short. Halftime

Crowell led 13-12. The turning point of the game came in the third quarter when Holliday blocked a Wildcat punt which set the Eagles up on the Cat 36. It took the Eagles nine plays to cross the double stripe. The final Holliday tally came on a 7-yard run by Donald Ross in the fourth quarter. Holliday did not make an extra point all night.

## REVENUE SHARING 'STRINGS' LISTED

Foard County, to receive \$39-  
296.00 in federal revenue-sharing  
funds, has been informed of rules  
governing spending the money.

The funds may not be used by  
state and local governments to  
match federal funds or other sim-

But they can be used to supple-

State governments may not reduce

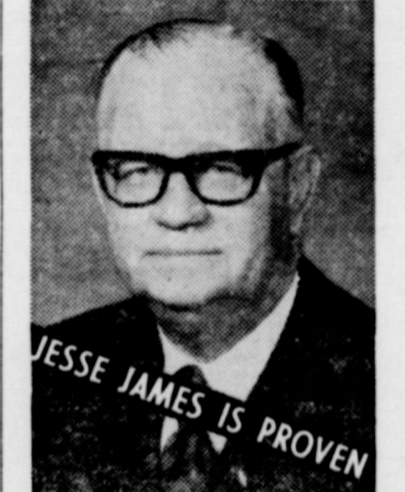
