**Santa Fe RR Co.
 Looks at Winter
 Wheat Situation**

Here's what the Santa Fe Crop
 Report's November newsletter has
 to say about the wheat crop:

Winter wheat: Most of the in-
 tended winter wheat acreage for
 the 1973 crop in Texas, Oklahoma,
 New Mexico, Kansas and Nebraska
 had been planted by mid-October
 with practically all acreage up to
 a satisfactory stand. Moisture sup-
 plies generally were adequate un-
 til early October when several
 days of record high temperatures
 and no moisture caused some
 stress to wheat plants in Texas
 High Plains and Low Rolling
 Plains and into adjacent areas of
 Oklahoma. Most of this area re-
 ceived moisture in beneficial
 amounts during the cold wet
 weather which hit just after mid-
 October. This should provide suf-
 ficient moisture to replenish sup-
 plies in the dry top soil and aid
 in setting the plants securely in
 the soil.

Additional moisture will be
 needed throughout the remainder
 of the fall, winter, and into the
 spring of 1973 to continue the
 present favorable outlook for the
 1973 hard winter wheat crop in
 most of the Great Plains, although
 present conditions generally are
 above average.

Insects and diseases are caus-
 ing some damage in a few areas
 with grasshoppers, greenbugs and
 rust causing some concern as are
 reports of possible wheat streak
 mosaic infestations.

While growth was generally ad-
 equate, grazing of wheat by live-
 stock was rather limited before
 mid-October because of loose dry
 top soil and lack of adequate
 crown roots on wheat plants.

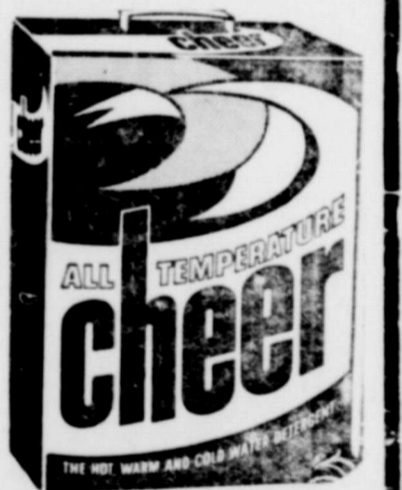
