## **Meeting Held Concerning New Development Act**

Plans for early implementation of the new Rural Development Plans Open House Act were discussed at a joint meeting of the Four Winds Industrial Foundation board of directors and representatives of the Farmers Home Administration at a recent meeting in Quanah.

The new act passed by Congress will provide direct federal loans and grants for commercial and industrial development of areas that have been hard-hit by loss of population and economic resources during the past 30 years.

The law will be administered by FHA in cooperation with area development groups such as the Four Winds.

Ernie Larmer of Fort Worth economic development specialist employed by Texas Industrial Commission to work with Four Winds Foundation, described the new law as the "broadest piece of legislation ever devised by Congress to get the job done" in rurl development. Larmer, with R. A. Yarborough


of Childress, executive director of Four Winds, discussed the act and pointed out the facets of the program that can be utilized in area economic development.




