





Altus Office Classes 20,800 Cotton Samples Last Week

The USDA Cotton Division Classing office at Altus graded 20,800 samples for the week ending December 15, and the season total stood at 142,900 samples classed. Total samples graded this year have fallen behind the fiveyear average for both the week and the season, according to C. E. Cox, officer in charge at Altus. This is due to weather and adverse harvesting conditions, since the estimate of cotton to be harvested this year still stands at about 300,000 bales, compared with a 5-year average of 230,000

Total classed from North Texas samples, compared with 519 samples last year at this date, and 23,800 two years ago.

The Agricultural Marketing Service reported that the cotton market was more active during the week. Total volume of sales was about double the previous week, but was still not up to normal for this time of the year. Demand continued to strengthen, and prices offered increased as much as 175 points on predominant qualities. Average prices on grades, 41, 51 and 42, staples, 31, 32, and 33, with mike readings from 3.5 to 4.9, were about 500 to 650 points above government loan rates. Cottonseed prices remained unchanged at \$51 per ton.







If an insured, sation insurance on his employees, the rates per \$100 of payroll will be published by the State Board of Insurance, as will be the rules and the form of the policy. If an insured buys a title insurance policy on his home or property, the form as well as the rate must be uniform and prescribed by the board. Automobile insurance companies must charge the rates prescribed by the board, but they may reduce the premium by payment of a dividend. This dividend allowance also applies to insurance companies which write fire and windstorm insurance on your

Finally, in addition to its ratemaking authority, the State Board of Insurance determines policy rules and methods of appeals from decisions of the Commissioner of Insurance. It also licenses insurance agents, and supervises the administration and enforce-

ment of the insurance code. In the area of insurance, the State Board of Insurance is the agency which is charged with the protection of the Texas consumer.



The gloves are built of an outer-shell of Chromel-R, a metallic fabric, and thermal insulation to protect a lunar astronaut's hands when he is handling extremely hot or cold objects. Silicone-rubber fingertips allow the gloves to give him more sensitivity to touch. The lunar overshoes, unlike the gloves, are an integral part of the suit. Built in two sections they employ a variety of exotic materials for insulation. The inner section is made up of 13 layers of Tefloncoated aluminized Kapton plastic, which are separated by 12 spacing layers of Marquisetta, a glassspun kind of taffeta, and Beta glass-fiber felt. The outer section of the lunar overshoes includes not only two additional layers of Beta felt underneath the siliconerubber and metal-fabric soles but also employs at least 16 layers of materials used in the EVA suit itself. Beta yarns are fireproof, and even when they are heated to their melting point of some 1350 to 1500 degree F., they will not burn. These glass fibers are the finest textile filaments known to mankind. They are not only fireproof but also have extraordinary insulation qualities. To guard




