## MOSCOW TO MOSCOW America's wheat is making a historic turnaround

transloading wheat to elevator and ship.

The history of wheat on the Santa Fe started back in the 1870's. At that time the railway sent representatives to Europe with a view in mind of winning settlers to Kansas. Through their efforts, the Mennonites emigrated from Russia in 1874 and brought with them a few sacks of wheat-red wheat-that thrived and transformed the Midwest and parts of the Southwest into the breadbasket of the world. Today, one of the cities not far from the center of the wheat belt on the Santa Fe, carries the name of Moscow, Kansas,


### Savings Bond Sales in County Lag During 1972


