From the News . . .

News items below were taken from the Thursday, March 4 1943, issue of The Foard County

The quota of \$2,250.00 which was assigned to Foard County in the American Red Cross war fund drive which was slated to begin on Monday morning, March 1 had been subscribed after five hours of work by the volunteer solicitors on last Friday. The International News Service has re leased the information from the Area Red Cross headquarters at St. Louis, Mo., that Foard County has established the record of being the first county in Texas and the Midwest in meeting the quota for the current drive for war funds for the American Red



Medical Expense Deduction Prime Tax Error Category

Many taxpayers get smaller refunds-or have to pay additional taxes-because they make errors in reporting medical expenses, W. T. Coppinger, district director of as, said this week

To avoid errors in deducting medical expenses on 1972 returns, Mr. Coppinger advised taxpayers to read the Form 1040 instructions carefully before filing.

A common error taxpayers made in reporting medical expenses is in deducting medicine and drug expenses. Taxpayers can add these expenses to their other medical expenses only to the extent they exceed one per cent of adjusted

"Some taxpayers," Mr. Coppin ger said, "try to deduct in full per cent of their adjusted gross cess to their other medical expenses, which are subject to a three per cent limitation.'

Another common error taxpayers made last year involved the medical insurance premium deduction. You can deduct one-half the descriptions.
