#### **Army Worms Damaging County's** Sorghum, Agent Says

Populations of fall armyworms and corn earworms are causing heavy foliage damage to sorghum plants by feeding in the plant whorl in Foard County, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent. In most cases it is very difficult to obtain effective control of these worms because, while in the whorl, they are protected from insecticides.

In most cases these worms do not damage the developing head. As sorghum plants grow into the boot stage, the whorl disappears and the remaining worms are prey for predators.

Sorghum yields will be reduced somewhat by feeding damage caused by these worms but in most cases control measures applied after foliage damage is apparent will not control worms effectively and will not increase yields enough to justify the control measures. Sorghum that has heavy foliage damage can make near average yields when moisture conditions

#### Immunizations listed for Crowell Students

The Crowell Schools, Monday released the following information relative to required immunizations for students:

For complete immunizations the following are required in the respective class or age groupings: Children in kindergarten and grades one through five:

Polio - At least 3 doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

Diptheria/Tetanus - Minimum of 3 doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday. (Usually given as DTP for children less than 6 years of age and older.)

Measles - One dose of vaccine, or history of measles Rubella - One dose of vaccine.



#### **Foard Cattle Producers** Invited to Meeting on Burcellosis

Cattle producers in Foard County are urged to attend a meeting in Vernon on August 23 regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be in the Western Room of the Memorial Auditorium in Vernon and will begin at 8 p. m., announced County Extension Agent, Joe

A veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be on hand to inform producers pending changes in the present brucellosis regulations. Commemts and feedback are being invited from producers and a statewide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on September 18th.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October 1st and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas, thus allowing the state to be declared Certified Brucellosis Free.

For all cattle producers to benefit from the new testing program, it is important that they become familiar with the new regulations. Thus the upcoming meeting on August 23rd will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the new plans for brucellosis
