Whitley, whose Rotary classification is "wholesale drug distribution" is actually incorrect, Whitley said, as drugs is one item he does not handle. Actually, he sells non-food items to retail stores, principally grocery stores. He has 25 accounts in this area and works stores in Crowell, Vernon, Thalia, Throckmorton, Albany, Anson, Quanah, Chillicothe, Benjamin, Knox City, Rochester and Haskell.

Whitley said that the non-food merchandising idea started in 1939, and the company he works for was established in 1946. In commenting on the some 10,000 different items which his firm handles. Whitley said that health and beauty aids, which he stocks in grocery stores, account for about 3 per cent of sales b"t account for about 25%



No Accidents **Reported Here** During Sept. The Texas Highway Patrol

investigated no accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of September. according to Sgt. Jack Therwhanger. Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1973 shows a total of four accidents resulting in no deaths, and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1973, shows a total of 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured as compared to September, 1972, with 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed, and 335 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, three more fatalities, and 29 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1973, occurred in the following counties: five each in Hardeman and Montague counties; two each in Palo Pinto, and Grav counties; and one each in Cochran, Floyd, Hale, Knox, Parker, Wise, Armstrong, Hansford, Ochiltree, and Potter counties.

The topics of the county-wide program at the Community Center October 19 was "How to Preserve Flowers and Foliage." The agent, Mrs. Rhonda Ward, introduced the program to 13 guests present.

A display of dried flower arangements and foliage was set up by Mrs. Hubert Brown, curbing, vases of Mrs. C. T. Hord and Mrs. Claudius Carroll. Mrs. Brown outlined six different methods of preserving: air-drying, silica gel, borax, glycerine, sand and press between the pages of a book. Then she discussed the 'how to" of each method and her success with them. She stressed several basic principals of preserving any flowers: cut at a crisp, peak bloom and keep them in water till you have time to dry them.


