Mrs. Ruby Ribble, 79, and a resident of Foard County since 1942, died in the Foard County Hospital Tuesday, October 16, after a brief illness.

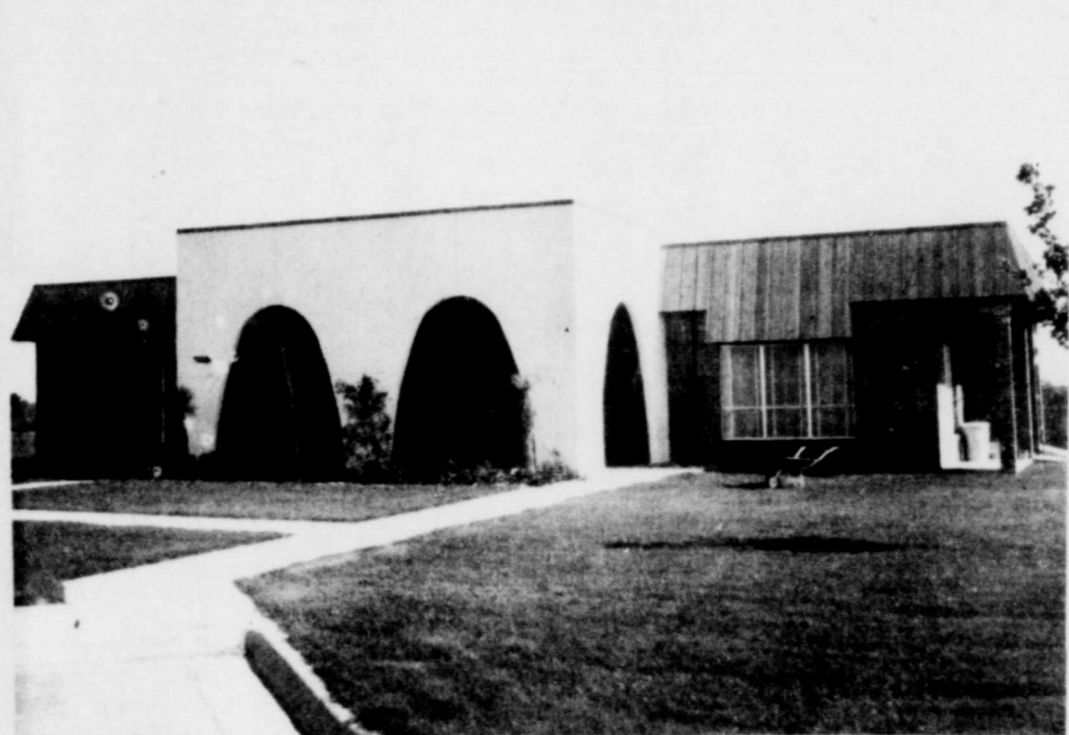

## Bank Deposits Near Million October 17

Bank deposits in the Crowell State Bank closed on October 17, 1973, were \$7,121,554.20 which is about \$1 million more than on the same date last year. On October 10, 1972, deposits were \$6,120,222 which at that time was an all-time high for deposits in the bank. The bank has received some \$100,000 from the state for a bank call which was on June 30 this year with some \$7,121,554.20 listed.

## Wildcats Take 39-13 Win Over Paducah

The Crowell Wildcats, after a week off last week for healing of injuries, completely dominated the Paducah Dragons here last Friday night, and walloped the speedy Dragons 39 to 13.

Paducah opened the scoring early in the first quarter and then again in the last minutes of the game with the Wildcats putting their 39 on the scoreboard in between.

David Bell scored the first Cat score when he caught a pass from quarterback Steve Graves. The play covered some 50 yards. Bell booted for the extra point. The next time the Cats got the ball, they marched the length of the field with Philip Bell going the final three yards. Try for

point failed. Crowell opened up the second quarter with another long drive topped by a five-yard run by Chevelo Ranjel. Again the try for extra point failed. Ending the first half scoring was a 2-yard run by Allen Tapp. This time Bell's kick was good to give the Cats a 26 to 7 halftime lead.

Tapp added two more scores in the second half, one each in the third and fourth periods for the final points.

Leading ground gainers for the Cats, who had 271 yards on the ground, were Tapp, the Bell brothers, Ranjel and Bob Taylor. Graves was 2 of 3 for 50 yards in passing. Ernest Barrera and Fred Matyssek led the Wildcat defense. Other Wildcats seeing action and doing a good job were, Rocky Glasscock, Ricky Hammonds, Keith McDaniel, Ernie Myers, Richard Naylor, Ricky Nichols, Melvin Westover and Hal Williams.

The Wildcat ball carriers averaged 7.5 yards per carry. Ranjel carried 14 times for 101 yards, Philip Bell had 10 carries for 85 yards, Bob Taylor lugged the pighide 8 times for 82 yards and Tapp had 13 carries for 76 yards.

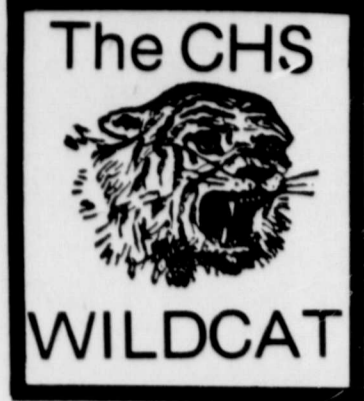

Health Department officials say that two-month-old infants should receive a DTP injection for protection against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis, as well as an injection for polio.

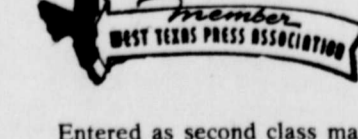

## Local Football Teams Lose Here Thursday Night

### Rotarians Hear Classification Talk Last Week

Rotarian Roy Whitley made a classification talk at the Wednesday, October 17 meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell. ## No Accidents Reported Here During Sept.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated no accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of September, according to Sgt. Jack Thewanger, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1973 shows a total of four accidents resulting in no deaths, and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1973, shows a total of 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured as compared to September, 1972, with 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed, and 335 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, three more fatalities, and 29 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1973, occurred in the following counties: five each in Hardeman and Montague counties; two each in Palo Pinto, and Gray counties; and one each in Cochran, Floyd, Hale, Knox, Parker, Wise, Armstrong, Hansford, Ochiltree, and Potter counties.

## Cattle Lice Hurt Livestock

Cattle lice cause heaviest damage to livestock in Foard County during the winter and spring but populations of these lice begin to build-up during the fall months. To delay and minimize the build-up of lice populations, producers should inspect and treat cattle during the fall, according to Joe Burkett, County Agent.

Cattle should be inspected periodically throughout the winter and spring and control measures should be applied when the lice populations become excessive.

For control of cattle lice various insecticides can be used as a spray, dust or dip. Information on these insecticides is contained in MP-691, "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites on Livestock and Poultry." This publication can be obtained from your County Extension Agent's office.

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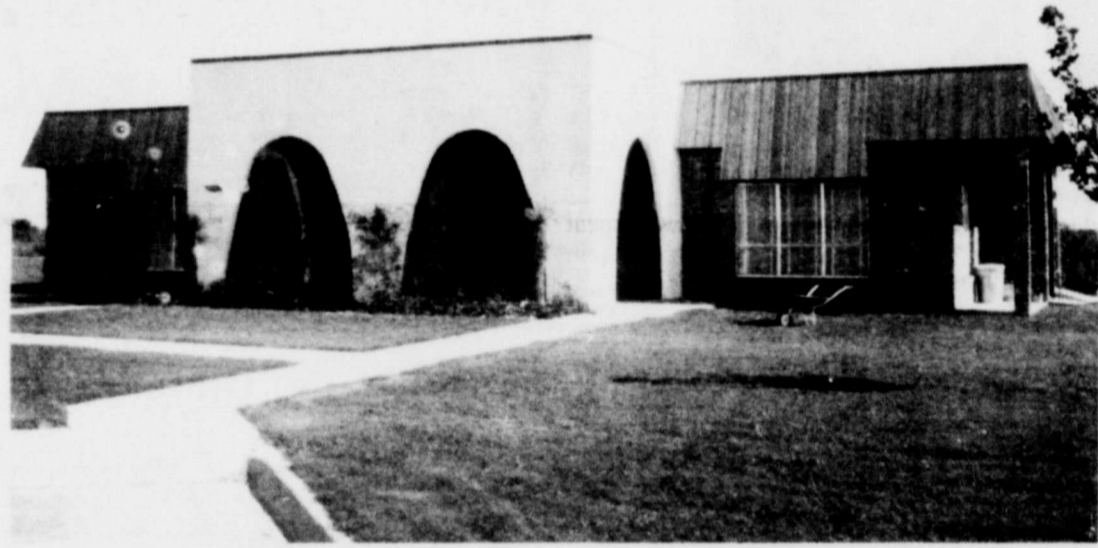

## Provisions Are Continued for Wheat Yields

"The basic provisions for proven wheat yields are continued under the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973," is the latest word from the Foard County ASCS Committee to Foard County wheat farmers.

Harold Fish, chairman of the Foard ASCS committee, in a letter sent out last week to Foard wheat farmers, says, "You may elect to establish a yield for your farm based on actual production rather than use the yield established by the county committee on a judgment basis. The base period for establishing 1974 farm yields is 1968-72. To prove your yield, you must have produced wheat on the farm in each of these five years and be able to provide reliable proof of production. Scale tickets alone are not acceptable evidence since the evidence must include a record

"Your 1973 production year if yields are to be proved for the 1975 program year. In order to assure continuation, you must file a request within 15 days from date shown on this letter (October 17). Production timely received will be considered before notifying you your official 1974 farm yield."

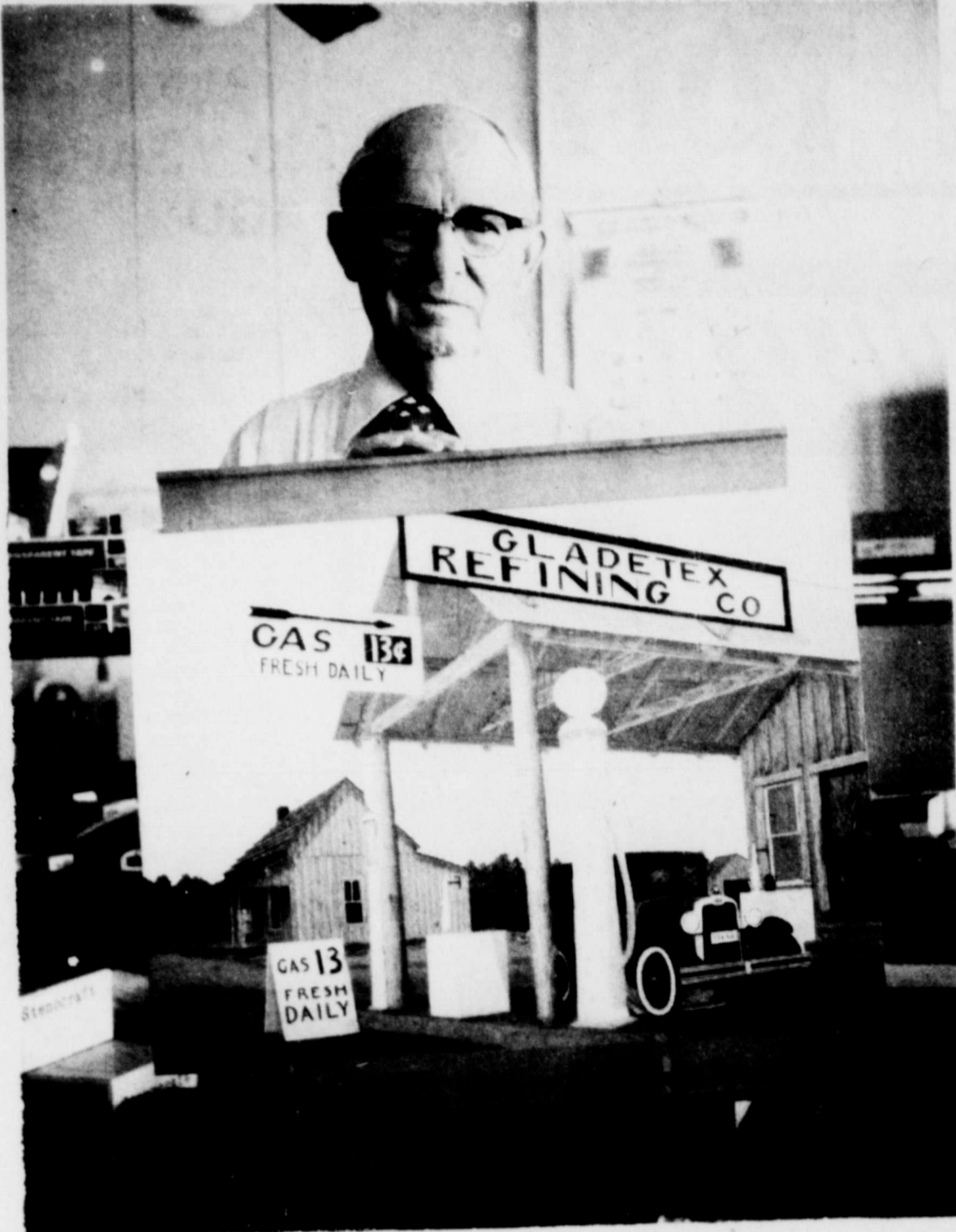

### Weldon Owens Died Friday in Wichita Falls

Funeral services for Weldon Owens, 62, a former Foard County resident, were held Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Vernon. Burial was in Wilbarger Memorial park under direction of Henderson-Fields Funeral Home.

Mr. Owens died Friday in a Wichita Falls hospital after a long illness. He was born March 22, 1911, in Kentucky, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Owens, pioneer residents of Foard County. The family moved to Foard County in 1913. He attended Foard County schools and was married to Cyrena Smith at Thalia in 1934. She died in Vernon in 1953 and in 1957 he married Mrs. Ruth Foerster in Vernon.

He moved from Foard County to Wilbarger County in 1934 and was a member of the First Baptist of Vernon. ## Time to Control Peach Tree Borers

Peach tree borers can cause severe problems in peach, plum, and apricot trees in this area. They can only be controlled successfully during this time of the year, says Joe Burkett, County Agent.

The insects overwinter in the ground around the tree trunk. In the spring they emerge as adults and lay eggs on the trunk near the ground. The eggs hatch into worms which bore into the trunk. Generally sap emerges from the holes during the summer months. Heavy infestation can kill the trees.

Paradichlorobenzene crystals, often called moth crystals, are used for control of the insects.

Further information on control of the peach tree borer is from Burkett.

## County-Wide Program Held Last Friday

The topics of the county-wide program at the Community Center October 19 was "How to Preserve Flowers and Foliage." The agent, Mrs. Rhonda Ward, introduced the program to 13 guests present.

A display of dried flower arrangements and foliage was set up by Mrs. Hubert Brown, Mrs. C. T. Hord and Mrs. Claudius Carroll. Mrs. Brown outlined six different methods of preserving: air-drying, silica gel, borax, glycerine, sand and press between the pages of a book. Then she discussed the "how to" of each method and her success with them. She stressed several basic principals of preserving any flowers: cut at a crisp, peak bloom and keep them in water till you have time to dry them.

The art of preserving can be a very rewarding and relaxing hobby. Just look around at all the wild flowers and weeds and grasses that will make into beautiful arrangements. The wheat, oats, and all kinds of grasses can be preserved by simply hanging upside down and air-drying in a dark place for 1 to 3 weeks.

Just think of a rainbow of colors you can obtain with florist paint. And a little hair spray will keep them together for years. Don't forget that heat will cause dry bouquets to become brittle, dampness will cause wilting and the sun will drain the color.

If you are interested in further information on preserving flowers and foliage, contact the County Extension Agent, Mrs. Rhonda Ward, or go to the library for a book, "The Art of Drying Plants and Flowers" or the September issue of House and Garden, 1973, "Flowers to Dry and How to Dry Them."
