Funeral services were held Monday, January 28, at 3 p.m. in Carmichel-Whatley Colonial Chapel in Pampa conducted by Rev. Albert Maggard, pastor of First Pentecostal Holiness Church in Pampa. Interment was in Memory Garden Cemetery.

Mr. Swan was born at Thalia March 30, 1923, son of Mrs. Julia Swan of Vernon and the late H. L. Swan. He attended Thalia School. He and the former Miss Doris Denton were married in 1948.

Glenn Carroll Is Injured in Gin Mishap

Glenn Carroll of Cee Vee, a native of Foard County and son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Carroll of Crowell, received severe injuries last Thursday night at the Farmers Gin in Cee Vee near Childress.

Mr. Carroll was helping make some repairs to the gin when the accident occurred which broke his right leg in four places below the knee and cut his left leg in several places. In addition he received lacerations to the head.

He was rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. His mother said Monday that he is recovering satisfactorily and will probably be in the hospital in Lubbock about a week.

School Board Employs New Teacher

Carl Brock, 26-year-old graduate of McMurry College in Abilene, was employed by the Crowell school last Thursday night as social studies teacher in junior high and high school. He began his duties Monday of this week.

Mr. Brock replaces James Vaile, who resigned effective last Friday to take a job with Internal Revenue Service. Mr. Vaile had been teaching here since the beginning of school last August.

Mr. Brock graduated from McMurry in December. He graduated from Knox City High School and he is a veteran of military service in Vietnam. He and his wife are the parents of two children, Johnny 4 and Michele 3.

In other action, the board gave contracts for the 1974-75 school year to Gordon Erwin and L.H. Wall, elementary and high school principals, at full-time state schedule salary.

Clyde Russell was employed beginning April 1 for custodial duties at the school, replacing Jimmy Quintero who has recently resigned. A trustee election was called for Saturday, April 6. Terms of Duane Johnson, Jeff Bell and Beverly Gray are expiring this year. L.A. Andrews was appointed election judge to be assisted by Mmes. Mattie Carroll, Thelma Garrett and Eleanor Black.

A total of \$3,428.12 in bills were approved to be paid. Local maintenance costs for the month were \$1,484.77, cafeteria expenses were \$1,898.75 and Title I costs were \$44.60.

The board voted to order one 54-passenger bus and one 19-passenger van for the coming year.

Joe Don Brown of the local EOAC office explained a program to board members which could possibly include the school in projects to improve the school plant whereby the federal government would foot most of the bill.

Board members reviewed the teachers in the school who have taken days off from teaching for personal convenience. Teachers are docked one day's pay for this, and the school pays substitute teachers \$15.00 a day.

In final action, the board approved the CHS band to stay in Amarillo two nights when the organization goes there in April for a contest.

Phone Rate Increase Coming March 13th

A mix-up in legal notices last week caused the News to say General Telephone Co. will give toll-free service from Waco to Truscott shortly. Actually, it will probably be two

years before this service is inaugurated, Mrs. Wilma Cates, city secretary, said Friday.

Also, the correct ordinance is being printed in this week's issue relating to raises in telephone rates in Crowell which will take effect March 13.

Business rate here is being jumped from \$11.00 per month to \$16.35 per month, with extensions being \$1.75 each. A one-party residence phone is going from \$5.45 to \$6.65 per month while a 2-party residence is being raised from \$4.70 to \$5.55 per month.

The ordinance appears on page 6 and explains the new rates.

H. L. Ayers, Jr., of Route 2, Crowell, president of the Foard County Farm Bureau, attended a two-day conference for newly-elected county Farm Bureau presidents Jan. 24-25 in Waco. Mrs. Ayers accompanied her husband to the conference.

Conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau, the third annual new presidents meeting was designed to give the county leaders a better understanding of the structure of the TFB and its operating procedures. Current programs and activities were also discussed.

Areas of activities covered in the orientation sessions included membership acquisition, state and national legislation, Constitution revision, public relations, commodity activities, economic service programs, and research and education.

While in Waco, the county leaders toured the Texas Farm Bureau's new \$2.7 million headquarters building. This building, which houses the organization and its service-to-member companies, was dedicated last June.

Foard County Farm Bureau is one of 209 organized county units in Texas. In 1973 all of those counties achieved a gain in membership, pushing the state total to more than 152,000 member families. The 1974 state goal is 170,000. The local county organization ended its 1973 year with 325 member families.

The Texas Farm Bureau is affiliated nationally with the American Farm Bureau Federation, largest general farm organization in the world. Farm Bureau is organized in all states except Alaska and ended with 2.3 million member families.

Highway Patrol Reports on Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Foard County during the month of December, according to Sergeant Jack Therwanger, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the year of 1973 shows a total of eight accidents resulting in no persons killed and eight persons injured.

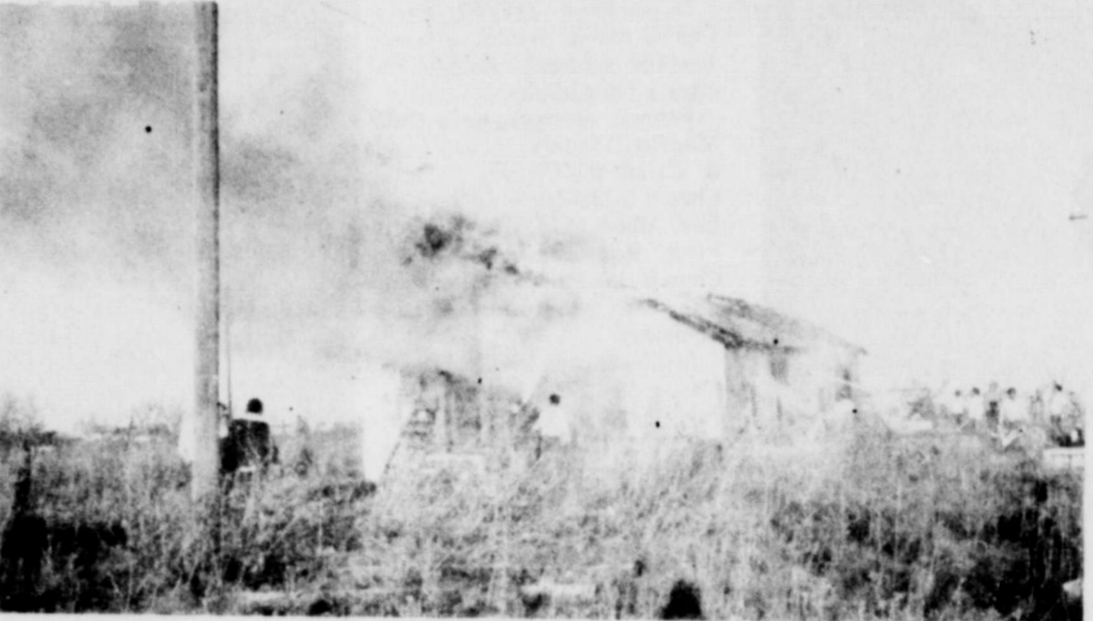

Brother of Local Man to Speak at Conference

Assistant Attorney General J. C. Davis, director of the State and County Affairs Division of the Attorney General's office in Austin, will discuss the laws affecting county government during the 16th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference at Texas A&M.

Mr. Davis is a brother of Foster Davis of Crowell. The conference is slated for February 6-7 at the Ramada Inn with the theme, "County Government: A Responsible Partner in Our Nation's Progress."

Davis is a noted legal authority on Texas county government, according to Charles E. The Farmers Home Administration has approved a \$325,000 federal grant and a \$329,000 loan to the King-Cottle Water Supply Corporation in continuing support of the establishment of a new water supply system for 225 rural families and businesses in Foard, King and Cottle Counties, Congressman Bob Price announced last week.

Phase I of the project is 70 per cent completed. It began in 1972 with federal approval of \$296,000 grant and a loan of \$334,000.

At Rotary Meeting Drug Treatment Center Director Speaks Here

Ken Coleman, director of the drug treatment center scheduled to open at Vernon in March, told members of the Rotary Club of Crowell at their Wednesday, January 23, meeting some interesting things about the new center and what is hoped will be accomplished with the patients who will be lodged there.

The new center will house a total of 272 persons at one time, and will be co-educational for young people ages 13 through 20. Only those youths with "hard" narcotic addiction, such as heroin, will be treated. They will come to the center from all parts of Texas and they can be committed to the center by either court order or by voluntary action of the person, who wants help in overcoming a drug addiction.

The particular type center being developed at Vernon is a pilot project and if it is successful in treating the addict, others will be built across Texas and the nation.

Mr. Coleman said young people are eligible for admittance to the center only after all local efforts to help the individual have failed. He said there is no problem to get the addict off drugs; the big problem is keeping them off. To aggravate the problem of keeping them off drugs, most young addicts when dismissed from the center, will return home to probably the same environment which caused them difficulty in the past.

He said the problem of drugs is not new; however, it is only in recent years that drugs, common to ghetto areas for years, have become more prevalent among the middle and upper class section of the nation's population. He added that as long as the problem remained in the ghetto, most people never gave it a thought, and it is only since it has affected the lives of people outside the ghettos that serious work is being done to help the drug addict.

In speaking of some of the causes of drug addiction, Mr. Coleman cited first breakdown of the family unit as a major cause, and he added that some problem usually causes the first use of drugs by an individual. Although much is said about drug pushers, most young people are introduced to drugs

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To Live in Quanah Snyder Man Named RC&D Coordinator

Von Kleibrink, a District Soil Conservation Service technician from Snyder has been named coordinator for the new Four Winds Resource Conservation and Development Program (RC&D) and plans have been made to get the project underway immediately. This announcement was made last week by Marvin Daniel of Vernon at a meeting of the Four Winds RC&D Committee in Quanah.

Kleibrink will maintain his office in Quanah at either the city hall or with other agricultural agencies.

The Four Winds RC&D is the sixth of its kind approved within Texas to date and the first in this general vicinity. Daniel pointed out that the project has been approved for planning with funds available for the coordinator and necessary secretarial help.

The comprehensive federal self-help program will get underway next month with meetings to acquaint people in the Four Winds area with the program and organization of an area technical committee to help formulate a program of action.

Daniel said the next six to 12 months will be spent in public meetings to draw up a program of work.

"And the program will be no better than the input of the local people," he pointed out. "The only limitation will be the imagination and initiative of the people in the Four Winds." Kleibrink's first job on taking over the new office will be to visit other RC&D projects in Texas. One project in East Texas has been active for some ten years. Daniel pointed out that RC&D designation gives top priority to area projects and helps clear away federal red tape in implementing them. Other area federal agencies have been notified of the approval of the Four Winds project and Daniel said he has already received numerous pledges of support. A native of Clifton, Kleibrink attended Tarleton College and graduated in 1961 from Texas A&M with a degree in range management. He joined the SCS in 1962. His wife is the former Nancy Driver of Cleburne, and the couple has four children. Henry Black of Crowell is chairman of the RC&D committee. J.A. Marr, also of Crowell, attended the meeting in Quanah last week.

Son of Crowell Couple to Present Papers at Symposium in Germany

(Editor's note: The following article concerning Dr. Robert F. Davis, a Crowell native and son of Mr. and Mrs. Foster Davis of Crowell, appeared in a recent issue of The Observer, a newspaper published on the Newark, N.J. campus of Rutgers University.)

In recognition of his pioneering research in the field of plant physiology, Dr. Robert F. Davis of the NCAS Botany Dept. has been invited to deliver two key papers at an international symposium in Germany this February.

Davis' invitation is one of eight sent to botanists in the United States. He will join 84 other scientists at the nuclear Research Center in Juelich, Germany on February 4-8. The symposium is designed to permit the participating scholars to compare their latest findings.

"Mr. Davis' invitation is a singular honor, not only for himself, but for the entire Botany Department here at Rutgers-Newark," remarked Dr. John Crow, the department chairman.

Dr. Davis' work involves a detailed study of the development of energy in plant cells. Using tiny micro-electrodes to measure both the electrical properties and hydrogen ion concentration (ph) of chloroplasts in plant cells, Davis has been able to provide important data to support a hypothesis regarding the creation of energy utilized in the growth of cells, (otherwise known as ATP). Davis is the first botanist to successfully record such data.

The Assistant Professor of Botany modestly describes his work as "tedious". With surgeon-like precision, he has been able to insert micro-electrodes into plant cell membranes without damaging the cells. In order to do this, he has confined his studies to a primitive land plant called the hornwort, which is unique in that it has one large chloroplast per cell.

Chloroplasts are the globular bodies, found in plant cells, in

which photosynthesis takes place. They are accompanied by mitochondria, which are found in animals as well as plants. An English botanist has theorized that the electrical potential across the membrane of mitochondria and chloroplasts in conjunction with hydrogen concentration results in the production of cellular ATP. Dr. Davis' research has provided a solid basis for further study of the behavior of cells, a field that has broad applications.

"If we know how cells react normally, then we can find out more easily how they become abnormal," states Davis. Thus the work of a plant physiologist may be of interest to a biologist searching for a cancer cure.

In addition to the results of his experiments involving chloroplasts, Dr. Davis will deliver a paper in Germany outlining a discovery he has made with regards to movements in certain plant parts. The Rutgers professor has found that electrical events similar to nerve impulses govern such movements.

Confining his study to plant roots, Davis has dispelled the traditional thought that regulation of the flow of materials entering the plant takes place at the surface of the root, and not within the vessels (or xylem tubes) which transverse the plant. Making use of the electron microscope and electrical resistance studies, Davis has revealed that vessels in young root tips have cytoplasm (cellular material) which controls what enters them. This knowledge is an important step

in agricultural research, particularly when applied to the intake of nutrient elements by plant, which is also a facet of Dr. Davis' work.

Dr. Davis has been involved with this latter project since 1966, when he was engaged in doctoral studies at Washington State University. Davis came to Rutgers-Newark from the Dept. of Neuro-Physiology at Columbia University in 1969. He has received post-doctoral fellowships from the National Institute of Health, and he attended an international symposium in Liverpool, England in 1972. He teaches plant physiology and botany seminar at Rutgers.

The German government is adequately impressed with Davis' work to grant him money to make the trip to this year's symposium. According to Dr. Crow, Davis is one of six scientists known to be researching the electrical properties of higher plants. Most of the others are Russians, with whom Davis maintains a correspondence through the auspices of Leningrad University.

"A world-reknown botanist named Dr. W. P. Anderson of the University of Liverpool stated this summer that, in his opinion, Dr. Davis will be the top plant physiologist in the United States within five years," commented Dr. Crow. "He's really putting Rutgers-Newark on the map."
