Ex-Rayland Teacher Buys HistoryBook

In March of this year when G. W. Humphreys who receives his mail at Box 327, Nocona, Texas, 76255, received his copy of They Loved The Land, he was not surprised that his name was omitted from the list of Rayland

teachers, for it was the two years, 1910-1912 that the young red-headed resident in Foard County had taught in the school which was one mile south of Ravland.

When he received a letter from Mrs. Virgil Johnson, chairman. Foard County Historical Survey Committee, telling him how to secure the recently-published supplement of the Foard County History, it was his first contact with Foard County since he left 62 years

30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, June 15, 1944, issue of the Foard County News:

J. A. (Adrian) Thomson, employee of the State Highway Department in Foard County for many years, has recently been promoted to maintenance foreman and transferred to Paducah where he has charge of the state highways in Cottle and King Counties.

A heavy rain last Thursday night, which registered 1.10 inches at the Crowell State Bank, almost filled the City Lake to full capacity and insures the people of Crowell the water they will need for at least two months.

Ennis Setliff, owner of the Setliff Machine Shop, announced Wednesday that he had employed W. B. Whitby to do the blacksmith work in his shop. Mr. Whitby is an experienced blacksmith and is well known here. Many years ago he worked in the blacksmith shop of the late J. R. Edgin and was employed for a time by Q. V. Winningham.

Work of installing vaults and equipment for the Brooks Frozen Food Lockers was completed the latter part of May and the plant was opened for business on May 27, and since that time twenty thousand pounds of meat and vegetables have been processed and put into the lockers.

The goal of the Fifth War Loan Drive which opened over the nation officially on Monday, June 12, is \$16,000,000,000. Foard County's part in that amount is \$145,000. County Chairman George Self states that he is confident that Foard County will buy its quota of the necessary bonds in record time.

Harvesting of Foard County's bumper 1944 wheat crop was stopped last Thursday night when a general rain fell over the county, which measured 1.10

inches here. When the rain stopped the harvest, a total of 796,600 bushels of wheat had been brought to the elevators.




Donation Total given for County

Contributions from the drive. which was held during May, Mental Health Month, will be used to support the programs of the Texas Association for Mental Health, a citizens' advocacy group. The mental health association works on behalf of the mentally ill and to promote mental health. Priorities this year include community and children's mental health services.

Providing education to prevent mental or emotional problems is an important function of the association. Currently the Texas Association for Mental Health is sending out the newsletter series, "Pierre the Texas Pelican" to all new parents in the state, in



conjunction with the Office of Early Childhood Development. Sent out periodically until the child is seven, the series deals with mental and emotional development of children. Over 7,000 new parents are added to the mailing list each month.

Emphasizing the extent of mental health problems, Tom J. Caldwell, Jr., President of the Texas Association for Mental Health, noted that one in four families is touched by a mental emotional disturbance or requiring professional help.

The number one health problem of the nation is mental illness", he said. "More people are affected by it than all other diseases combined, including heart and cancer.'

Yet today we know that mental illness can be cured, and it can be prevented. It is only through strong citizen support as demonstrated by Ms. Jan Bond, the local Bellringer, and the people of Crowell that the mental health association will be able to continue its work."

Caldwell emphasized that legislative action is needed and he urged citizens to write their elected officials in support of mental health legislation.

Most dry foods, such as cereals, candies, dessert mixes, and noodle products, are actually overfilled-that is, they weigh more than the label states.

This is a finding of a recent survey of over 11,000 dry foods by the Food and Drug Administration to determine if the weights printed on the labels of dry foods are accurate. FDA found that the average amount of overfill was 4% more than the label declaration.






