





to 30 feet deep in the area of Devil's Creek which wanders through the 1933 acre State Park before emptying into the Pease River less than a mile from the dam.

An Open Letter Lowell to Foard County Residents In recent months there has

been some changes made in the 'Red Cross Blood Program.' First of all, if you give blood, you, your family or your spouce's family (parents, grandparents, etc.) will be entitled to the corresponding number of units for twelve months without being asked to have it replaced. You might call it a "Family Reserve Blood Supply." This DOES NOT mean that if you do not give you will

not receive blood when you or your family needs it. Second; no eligible donor will be refused if they come before the cut off time. The blood mobile will accept donors from 3:30 until 7:00 p.m. regardless. Anyone from the ages of 18 to 66 is considered a prospective donor. Some of the past

restrictions have been lifted or revised to help out. Third: THE QUESTION OF "Quota" has come into light. A quota is set because this is a projected usage for our area. If this quota (63) is not met we

face the posibility of being cut off from transfers out of our region or possibly, if it gets bad enough, even being cut out of the program completely. I personally do not wish to see either one of these instances happen. We are a part of a program that presently provides all blood and blood products for 35 participating hospitals serving over 350,000 people in a

20,000 square mile area of Texas and Oklahoma. As long as United States (provided the

hospital will accept replacement by Red Cross). A great deal of people have a gross misunderstanding about the charges they receive when they have to have blood. This is

not a charge for the blood itself, but a blood service charge. A private blood bank charges for the blood it distributes because they have to pay to obtain it. Since the Red Cross receives blood voluntarily, only a fraction of the operational costs is charged. The balance of the cost

of operating this program is obtained by Red Cross through your Red Cross and/or United charge as high as \$100.00 for a equally as well.

Increases Set for Veterans

The timetable for payment of Fort Worth of the Masterson increases to some 2.5 million family. The family lived on the service disabled veterans and dependents of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities was reported today by the Veterans Administration.

A new law (Public Law 93-295) signed by the President May 31 increased disability compensation payments to veterans by 15 to 18 per cent, and dependency and indemnity compensation for widows and children by about 17 per cent. The statue made the increases retroactive to last May 1.

A separate retroactive check covering the increases for the months of May and June will be sent by VA to the veterans and dependents by mid-July.

The regular monthly checks due next on July 1 will be paid at the old rate, but the new increases will be reflected in checks received August 1 and thereafter.

He was born in Jackson. Tenn., and had been a resident of Killeen since 1964. He was a veteran of World War II. retiring in December 1964.







Miss Alene Parker of Tuskegee, Ala., served as maid of honor. She and the bride were classmates at David Lipscomb College in Nashville, Tenn.







- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat conto slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position

WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.

- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.; Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls - on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light

30 Years Ago in The News

Harvesting of a millionbushel wheat crop by the farmers of Foard County came to a close the first of the week as suddenly as it started three weeks ago. Total amount is 1,002,177 bushels and G. V. Walden, agent for the Panhandle & Santa Fe Railroad, said Wednesday at noon that 425 cars of wheat had been shipped from the county. It is estimated that all of the present crop that has sold has averaged \$1.40 per bushel. Average yield is around 20 bushels per acre.




Cheerleaders Win Honors at Cisco Camp
